

The Orchard Lake Schools, a private, Catholic center of formation and education, are located on the eastern shore of Orchard Lake, 25 miles northwest of Detroit at the corner of Orchard Lake and Commerce Roads in the City of Orchard Lake Village. The 115-acre campus, which encompasses SS. Cyril & Methodius Seminary, St. Mary's Preparatory, the Orchard Lake Polish Mission, as well as Madonna University's Orchard Lake Center, has been designated a Michigan Historical Site and placed on the National Register of Historic Places. Established in Detroit in 1885 as an American Polish Seminary by Rev. Joseph Dabrowski, today the Orchard Lake Schools are united by their tri-cultural — Catholic, Polish, and American — heritage, as well as their shared commitment to faith formation through Catholic education, tradition, and community service.

Joseph Dabrowski and Witold Buchaczkowski, would be included. These priests, respectively, because, Fr. Dabrowski founded the Schools 125 years ago, and Fr. Buhaczkowski relocated them to their present site on Orchard Lake 100 years ago. Use of the painted image of Our Lady of Orchard Lake was chosen for its vibrant color and lifelike appearance, the trees to represent our location in the north, and the Orchard Lake Schools crest, as the working symbol which joins all that OLS does — Catholic Formation, Excellence in Education, Promotion and Preservation of the Polish-American Heritage. Finally the sloping text on the sides of the Shrine Chapel's roof, were placed in that form, to signify both the constancy of our prayers and worship, as well as the fluid, dynamic nature of our identity — ever-growing, ever-responding to the needs of the given culture, the given times, yet deeply rooted in the Roman Catholic tradition.

After completing his B.S., Accounting, at the University of Detroit (U-D) in 1962, he earned his M.A., Economics, in 1964 from U-D as well.

Since becoming an OLS Regent in 1991, Drobot has served as Chairman, Vice Chairman, and Budget Committee Chair. He is also a member of the Budget and Grievance Committee of the Polish Roman Catholic Union of America (PRCUA), member of the Board of Directors at Freedom House in Detroit, and a member of the Finance Committee of the Lourdes Senior Center in Waterford.

Residents of Bloomfield Hills, Drobot and his wife, Judy, of 44 years, have four children and seven grandchildren. They are members of St. Regis Parish in Birmingham. In their spare time, the couple performs Karaoke singing for residents of senior centers and nursing homes throughout metro Detroit.

THE OLS CHANCELLOR ON THE ANNIVERSARIES: THEN AND NOW

Fr. Whalen, the Orchard Lake Schools are enjoying the 100th Anniversary of our move to the beautiful shores of Orchard Lake. In your reading and studies as Chancellor, what have you found in archival reports that explain Fr. Buhaczkowski's monumental decision to move the Schools from the comparative safety of St. Aubin Street in Detroit, to this property, which in 1909, would have been an extremely remote location, some 25 miles from civilization?

Moving to Orchard Lake in 1909 from our original building on St. Aubin was not a luxury. It was a much-needed solution to a desperate space situation in Detroit. The decision was made out of necessity,



caused by an *explosion* of students which paralleled Polish immigration to the United States at the time. In 1887, when the first official academic year commenced, enrollment stood at 25 students. By 1903, when Fr. Buhaczkowski succeeded Fr. Dabrowski, becoming the second rector, enrollment reached 205. The Seminary was in the middle of its first major expansion, which included a new Chapel. In 1909, the Seminary expanded a second time, with the construction of a classroom-gymnasium building on Garfield Ave. This provided little relief, however, for the overcrowding caused by 300 students and 20 resident faculty members. Under Fr. Buhaczkowski, trunk and assembly rooms were transformed into temporary dormitories and students were forced to use the chapel and refectory in shifts. Because of the miserable

conditions caused by overcrowding, more and more students were being turned away. At this point, with similar growth in the neighborhoods, there was no space in proximity to plan yet a *third* expansion to the original facility.

When news of the availability of the grounds and buildings of the former Michigan Military Academy (MMA) reached Fr. Buhaczkowski in 1909, it must have been the answer to his many prayers and novenas. As for the students, they were familiar with the property at Orchard Lake because they had competed against the MMA

in baseball. Unfortunately, the students learned about the purchase when they read the front page of the May 13, 1909 edition of *The Detroit News*, which someone had brought to a baseball game. To the coaches' dismay, the game was forfeited within minutes, when about 100 students rushed back to the Seminary to confirm the good news. By 1910 when the Apostolic Delegate came to the Orchard Lake campus to officially dedicate the new Seminary, enrollment was at 550. By this time students were applying for admission from all over the United States.



Thank you, Fr. Whalen. So, it sounds like moving to Orchard Lake was the perfect answer. Did the neighborhood people help the seminarians pack? How long did it take? How did they physically move lock, stock, and barrel up to Orchard Lake in those days? What was unusual or interesting about the trip?

When Fr. Dabrowski began going door to door in 1884 in the Polish neighborhood, collecting money to build his Seminary and then helped to construct the building by laying bricks and doing carpentry with his own hands, the area around St. Aubin and Forest Streets was still fairly open for development. However, 25 years later, *The Detroit News* reported, "Factories have sprung up on all sides, and the close proximity of the block occupied by the Seminary to the tracks of the Grand Trunk Railway makes its location highly desirable as a site for another factory. In every way, therefore, the Diocese stands to gain by the removal of the Seminary to Orchard Lake."

This fact, combined with the uncomfortable, crowded conditions within the building, despite two major expansions, would lead you to believe that everyone would have supported the decision to move the Seminary to Orchard Lake. However, the neighborhood *Poletown* residents felt betrayed when they learned that the school was moving 25 miles away. Because they had responded to Fr. Dabrowski's solicitations for funding, had contributed to the Seminary's construction, and because their own sons were being educated within its walls, they felt a sense of ownership. Still, no one could have imagined what would happen to this bustling and vibrant community in the decades to follow. If Fr. Buhaczkowski had listened to his critics, the dream of Fr. Dabrowski would have died in Detroit. Clearly, it was God's will that the Seminary leave St. Aubin Street and move to Orchard Lake — even though the last addition to the building, which included classrooms and a gymnasium, had just been completed.

And so, as soon as the equipment and furnishings of the Michigan Military Academy were auctioned off and removed on July 20-21, 1909, the Seminary students and faculty began loading up flat cars on the railroad tracks that lay next to their building to transport all the Seminary furnishings to their new campus in the country. The railroad tracks, which now serve as a walking trail on the perimeter of our OLS campus, became a life-line. The move was a huge undertaking and an arduous one. It took 11 trips, made between 2 AM and 4 AM, when the tracks



were not being used for commercial purposes, to move desks and beds and statues and altars from one world to another. History would prove, however, that it was worth the hard work . . . and that the \$83,000 that Fr. Buhaczkowski paid for the Orchard Lake property would be a visionary and priceless investment.

Today Fr. Buhaczkowski and Fr. Dabrowski rest next to each other at Mt. Elliot Cemetery. When they first met and Fr. Dabrowski named Fr. Buhaczkowski his Vice-Rector, neither priest realized how their lives would be entwined for eternity.



This month, June 2009, we also begin the Inaugural of the 125th Anniversary of our Founding in 1885 by Fr. Joseph Dabrowski. Fr. Whalen, would you please put yourself in his shoes and tell us what similarities there would have been in your responsibilities as Chancellor today and those of Fr. Dabrowski, the head of the Schools in 1885? Perhaps you can point out some differences between his role and yours as we consider the Anniversary — parts of your respective roles that are not immediately obvious to us?

A. My love and my respect for Fr. Joseph Dabrowski, our Founder and the Founder of the Polish American Parochial School System, grew tremendously in 2003 when we celebrated the Centennial Anniversary of his death. I had translated and read everything I could find about him, so that I could speak about him knowledgably, and, in the process, I think I came to understand his heart and spirit. When Fr. Leopold Moczygemba, the Founder of Panna Maria, Texas, (First Polish American Settlement), asked Fr. Dabrowski to take

on the work and responsibility of building the Seminary, which was originally planned for Nebraska, Fr. Dabrowski, who was already starting to experience failing health, could have very easily declined. Instead, he accepted this tremendous responsibility because I believe he came to understand that if this undertaking was God's will, then God would see it through to completion. As I told Archbishop Allen Vigneron recently, in my first meeting with him, I would never have come to Orchard Lake in 2000 if I hadn't believed that God has a plan and a purpose for Orchard Lake, and it was His will that I return here. I think that both Fr. Dabrowski and I recognized our weaknesses and the tremendous challenges that lay ahead of us when we accepted our leadership roles, but both of us also had enough grace-filled experiences in our lives and ministry to believe that *nothing is impossible for God*.

I believe that Fr. Dabrowski and I could also commiserate that *finances* and *conflict resolution* on campus are two unpleasant issues we face daily. Fr. Dabrowski had to build the original Seminary building, and from the day I stepped onto campus I knew that we had to build a multi-million dollar


library, in order to keep the Seminary in operation. God has blessed our Schools with many generous benefactors over

the years, mostly from within Polonia, but our need to build, improve, and renovate never seems to end. We could spend millions of dollars in 24 hours. Of course, both of us would understand fully, that we could never do enough to plan for the future. He probably dreamt that the Mission of the Schools would continue into the $21^{\rm st}$ century, and we have to plan for the Schools to continue to thrive as centers of Catholic formation, academic excellence, and Polish culture into the $22^{\rm nd}$ century — God willing!



Annual Retreat for Priests in the Polish Lanuage Held June 1-4

The Annual Retreat for Priests in the Polish Language at SS. Cyril & Methodius Seminary in June was very well-attended. Led by His Excellency Bishop Stanisław Budzik, the 2009 Retreat focused on the teachings of St. Paul, in keeping with the Pope Benedict XVI's designation of the last 12 months, as the *Year of St. Paul*. Bishop Budzik conducted in-depth reflections on the men's vocations as priests, using the *New Testament* passage, *1 Corinthians 1: 26.* "Consider your own calling, brothers. Not many of you were wise by human standards, not many were powerful, not many were of noble birth."

A priest for 32 years, Bishop Budzik was ordained a Bishop on April 4, 2004, becoming Auxiliary Bishop of the Roman Catholic Diocese of Tarnów, Poland. According to Church statistics, the Tarnów Diocese is the most religious diocese in Poland, with 72.5% weekly Mass attendance. Two years ago, Bishp Budzik was elected the Secretary General of the Polish Episcopal Conference,

He completed course studies in the Doctorate of Ministry through St. Mary's University in Baltimore. Ordained in 1973, he held numerous pastoral assignments until July 2004, when Adam Cardinal Maida assigned Fr. Ulman pastor of St. Mary of the Hills Parish, Rochester Hills. Fr. Ulman served as Vicar of the SERF and North Central Vicariates, as well as on the Archdiocesan Presbyteral Council oh which he is the current chairman. Tentative topics include:


- Preparing Seminarians for Parish Ministry in America






SSCMS WELCOMES NEW FACULTY, ANNOUNCES STAFF ASSIGNMENTS



While reference and bibliographic instruction are two areas of librarianship upon which Noel concentrates, she maintains a special interest in information literacy, serving on a Michigan Library Association workgroup dedicated to this issue. She maintains that in this evershifting, data-driven society, both traditional and non-traditional methods of information seeking are vital. Noel has memberships in the American Library Association, Special Libraries Association, Michigan Academic Libraries Council, and the American Theological Library Association. She remains passionate about reading and writing in many various forms and enjoys gardening, skiing, cooking, travel, and music in her spare time. Noel and her husband, Rick, are residents of Royal Oak.


"Archbishop Vigneron is very supportive of seminaries and takes



As we go through the crazy days PRIOR TO PRACTICE FOR THEIR of administration, reacting to every new situation, and trying to solve every BACCALAUREATE MASS. unique problem, sometimes we do not take the time to properly appreciate the many great things that are happening at OLSM. The Headmaster's Letter gives me an opportunity to not only turn introspectively toward my Alma Mater and my career, but to share those musings with you our loyal alumni and friends. It seems strange to be sitting at my computer screen in late Spring without a single state championship under our belts. We have been spoiled by our successes to the point that we expect greatness and dominance in every season. In my ten years as Headmaster, we have been unbelievably blessed with nine state titles. I must constantly remind the students that this winning streak is an anomaly, not the norm. We all have to remember that from 1933 to 1977, we didn't earn a single state title. Suffering a 44-year drought is not easy for any school, but it goes to show that great teams with great programs don't always make it to the big dance. Spring sports are wrapping up. Once again our teams have risen to the top like cream. After rebounding from two horrific seasons in 2006 and 2007, with a winning record in 2008 under new Coach Greg Normand, Eaglet Lacrosse is on the rise this season.

Lacrosse is enjoying a level of success that we have not seen for more than ten years – the Eaglets are serious contenders for a state title. (See P. 41) Adopting Coach John Ray's penchant for hard work and solid technique, OLSM Rowing is once again tops in Michigan and a force with which to be reckoned in Midwest and National regattas. Eaglet Golf, under seasoned Coach Kris Daiek, looks capable of improving upon last year's third place finish in the state tournament (See P. 40). Coach Mark LeFevre's Track team, though few in number, has been competitive in dual meets and invitationals. After winning the regional championship, Track is also a serious contender for a state title. Playing in the absolute toughest league in the state, Eaglet Baseball, under Coach Nick Di Ponio, is preparing for its second season, the state playoffs. (See P. 40).

What we have done this year is to put out incredibly competitive and sportsmanlike teams in every sport with some top notch athletes, who have garnered a myriad of wonderful, personal accolades. At the conclusion of Hoops, Dion Sims finished fourth in the state voting for *Mr. Basketball* — though he will always be *number one* in our book. Jordan Kieltyka was named the *Best Scholar-Athlete* in all of Michigan high school Hockey. Kieltyka is our fourth such player to receive that distinguishing honor in nine years. Saving the best for last, Ryan Anderson is perhaps the greatest athletic-scholar that the state of Michigan has ever seen. His cross country and track careers have been punctuated by a perfect score on the ACT,

two perfect scores on the SAT II, a National Merit Scholarship, and the recognition of being one of the top 100 high school mathematics performers in the United States (SEE P. 30). Now he takes his talents to the international level of competition.

As the acceptance letters from major universities continue to arrive for our seniors (SEE P. 28), OLSM touts four appointments from the Class of 2009 to the United States Naval Academy at Annapolis. This feat has allegedly never been rivaled by any high school in the Midwest. The Naval Academy administration has told us that four appointments might happen once a decade in a handful of prep schools in and around Washington, D.C., typically where congressmen's children are enrolled, but it does not happen in a little, 500-student, all-male, Catholic school in Michigan. Bret Anstett, Gabriel Charette, Pierce Niemiec, and Eric Peart were thrilled at the Honors Convocation in May, when a visiting U.S. Naval officer presented them with their written appointments in front of the entire student body (SEE P. 25). What could be more spectacular than seeing these young men offering their talents and courage to defend the United States of America? OLSM alumni also continue to do great things. Michigan State University's point guard and Big Ten Player of the Year and MVP Kalin Lucas (P'07) led his Spartans to the NCAA Men's Basketball Championship Final Four, as a sophomore

(SEE P. 71). His talents have helped bring light to the Prep and the Our Blessed Mother's holy name, St. Mary's — hundreds of times in the national and local media. His poise, talent, and character bring pride to all of us associated with "OLSM! #1 in Michigan!" as well as glory to his Alma Mater. Did you know that Kalin takes time to call his former coaches and teachers to thank us for the right start that St. Mary's

Preparatory has given him and the guidance that faculty and staff provided? Every alumnus takes equal pride in Kalin's performances, and although he and the Spartans fell just short of a National Championship, it was a spectacular run.

As he graced the cover of *Sports Illustrated* in early March, I think each of us longed for the days when he wore the red and white of the Eaglets. 

PREP STUDENTS TEST MATH PROWESS IN NATIONAL COMPETITION

Thirty-five St. Mary's Prep students participated in the American Math Competition (AMC) in late February. Sponsored annually by the Mathematical Association of America, the 2009 event enjoyed the participation of more than 2,400 schools and 220,000 students across the nation. The competition is divided into two tests: the AMC 10, for Freshmen and Sophomores, and the AMC 12, for Juniors and Seniors.

Overall, OLSM students performed very well compared to the national average. Freshman Pranav Chintala scored 106.5 on the AMC 10 Exam, for which the national average was 71.6. Chintala's was the highest score among OLSM

students for the AMC 10. Pranav's score also ranked higher than the national average for high score, within a school. The St. Mary's Preparatory *team score* for the AMC 12 Exam was 307, well above the national team average of 268. Two students, Sam Feldman and Ryan Anderson, scored in the top 5% nationwide and were invited to participate in the American Invitational Mathematics Exam.

OLSM's participation in the AMC Exams was largely the result of the dedication and efforts of OLSM Math Department Instructors, Kathleen Tajima and Alan Maestri, who worked tirelessly with Prep students, preparing them for the AMC Exams.

MICHIGAN MATHEMATICS PRIZE COMPETITION

Hasan Al-Halees, director of the *Michigan Mathematics Prize Competition*, announced that St. Mary's Preparatory senior Ryan Anderson finished in the top 100 and was honored at an awards banquet in March at Saginaw Valley State University. In addition, OLSM junior Dae Han Kim scored in the top 150, while OLSM senior Seok Jae Hong,

finished in the top 1,000 of the 10,000 students who took the test in Michigan.

OLSM's Ryan Anderson and Sam Feldman, also finished in the top group of those taking the American Mathematics Competition, and went on to take the American Invitational Mathematics Examination in April of this year.

ACADEMIC ACHIEVEMENTS OF St. Mary's Prep Students Continue -

PREP STUDENTS EAGERLY ACCEPT CHALLENGE OF ADVANCED PLACEMENT CLASSES AND EXAMS

As a Catholic prep school, St. Mary's Preparatory constantly searches for ways to challenge our students. One way is Advanced Placement (AP) courses. AP courses provide an opportunity for students to earn college credits before setting foot on a college campus. A strong sign that our students understand the importance of establishing themselves as committed students while thinking about their academic careers and beyond, has recently been apparent — OLSM is witnessing an increased demand for AP classes from the student body.

AP classes help students determine if a particular subject may be of interest for future pursuit in college as a major or minor course of study. AP courses are designed to accurately reflect an introductory college class. OLSM Instructors must submit a syllabus that

St. Mary's Preparatory National Honor Society

Academic excellence has always been at the center of life at St. Mary's Preparatory. In early April, the OLSM community recognized the continuation of academic achievement by inducting 25 students into the National Honor Society. Eligibility begins with a student's cumulative GPA of 3.65 or higher. Students must also demonstrate a commitment to community service and have exceptional personal character. Eligible students submit a mandatory application, which is reviewed by a committee of faculty members. The 2009 OLSM inductees are recognized in a brief ceremony following a Prep weekday morning Mass in the Shrine Chapel of Our Lady of Orchard Lake. The annual event allows the Prep to honor those students who have worked to provide a positive influence in the classroom and in the community.

Membership in NHS requires an active role in service to the community. NHS members provide tutoring to students in every grade level. The tutoring process allows members to interact with students of different grade levels and develop friendships that often transcend those grade levels. The OLSM-NHS currently works with Our Lady of Refuge Parish School (OLR) in a program in which NHS members regularly visit classes at OLR to intereact with elementary and middle school students. A pilot version of the program is underway due to the work of Thomas Oppat, OLSM Campus Minister and Academic Dean. The goal is to create teams of Prep students who will work in the same OLR classroom twice each month.

reflects the rigor of the class to the State College Board for approval. Only when the course has been approved by the College Board can school transcripts indicate that a class is, in fact, an Advanced Placement course.

Each May, OLSM teachers conduct AP exams in many subjects, including English, Science, Spanish, Math, and Social Studies. Tests are scored on a scale of one to five. Most colleges and universities will give a student full credit for a class if they earned a four (4) or five (5) on the AP exam. The test scores help St. Mary's Preparatory in two important ways: (1) by determing if current course content challenges our students; and (2) by ensuring that our content is appropriate and that it increases students' readiness for the academic environment at the college level.



St. Mary's Preparatory Campus Minister and Academic Dean Tom Oppat reports that OLSM and Chancellor Fr. Timothy Whalen hosted two *KAIROS* retreats this school year at Colombiere, the Jesuit Retreat House in Clarkston. Thirty-five junior/senior candidates, seven student leaders, and six faculty leaders attended *KAIROS* in December. The March *KAIROS* was home to 34 junior/senior candidates, seven student leaders, and five faculty leaders for three days during Lent.

KAIROS focuses on removing oneself from the secular world to concentrate on personal relationships with God, family, others, and, most importantly, self. An interesting twist to KAIROS is that students' timepieces, including cell phones, laptops, and ipods, must remain at home, so worldly interruptions don't interfere with the KAIROS encounter. Many students have difficulty with the concept, initially, but by the conclusion of KAIROS, they understand and truly appreciate the down time, The LORD'S TIME. Oppat and Fr. Whalen plan two *KAIROS* retreats during the next school year, as well.


STUDENT REFLECTIONS ON KAIROS

Cameron Taylor, Junior: "We left for KAIROS on a beautiful winter day, not exactly knowing what to expect. Rumors had been thrown around about what we were going to do there, but no one knew. By the time I had left the Colombiere Center to head back to St. Mary's on the fourth day, I was a changed man. So far, KAIROS is the greatest experience in my life. The retreat changed some of my thoughts, actions and most importantly my behaviors – these changes I feel are only for the better. Throughout the retreat, I was able to mend broken friendships, gain new friends, meet new guys from the Prep that I had never talked to and grow in my relationship with God. *KAIROS* is not just four days of constant prayers and worship to God. It is a time spent away from all the noise, chaos and problems of the world in a true Christian community. In this time, you gain a stronger relationship with other people, your family, yourself and God. It is an opportunity to break down barriers that are normally created in a school of all guys, and replaces them with a closer understanding of each other. KAIROS has helped me be less myopic, more open to others' views, to be less judgmental, less sarcastic and less harsh. I would encourage everyone to experience KAIROS."




Twice Weekly Mass For All Prep Students Provides Necessary Time For God In The Lives Of The St. Mary's Men

The 96th season of Eaglet basketball began with two losses in the first four non-league games. Though not picked to win the Catholic League for the fourth consecutive year, St. Mary's was still a force to be reckoned with despite losing considerable senior experience to the 2008 graduation. All-State forward Dion Sims

returned but had to shoulder inside responsibility because the team lacked experienced height. Coach George Porritt revamped his offense and defense to take advantage of what he did have: plenty of speed and outside shooting. The Eaglets' finished fourth in the CHSL Central Divison at 6-4, and lost by three to De La Salle in the CHSL semifinals. St. Mary's won its 39th District Title, however, only to lose to Hartland at the buzzer in the MHSAA Class A Regional Semifinal. Dion Sims was named 1st Team All-American, 1st Team All-State, 1st Team All-Area, 1st Team All-Metro North, Oakland County Dream Team, CHSL All-Catholic, and was a finalist for the coveted Mr. Basketball award. Gary Hunter was named CHSL All-League, and Jeff Jones was named CHSL All-Academic.

Under new coach Jeff Hoffman (P'02) and assistant Chris Brecht (P'00), the Eaglet wrestlers went 9-10 in dual meets, finishing 4th in the Catholic League Championship, and were runners-up in the Team Districts to Oxford. The team was led by senior Andrew Biebuyck, who became the sixth Eaglet to have 100 or more career wins. Biebuyck, Eric Stock, RJ Bayne, and James Huddleston were named All-Catholic, and Biebuyck was also named All-District.

— Icemen —


The defending Division 1 State Champion Eaglets opened their season against co-champion Marquette in Champs for Charity to benefit Make-A-Wish Foundation with a 2-1 victory. The Eaglets went on to win 20 more games to finish the season 21-6-1, the most wins since the 2004-05 state championship season. Coach Brian Klanow's team also won the Regional Championship for the fifth consecutive year (1 in Division 3, 4 in Division 1). Near the end of the regular season, St. Mary's won the Traverse City Tournament, both games in the Trenton Showcase, and entered the state playoffs on a five-game win streak. The Eaglets outscored their opponents in the regional, 12-4, but came up short against Grosse Pointe North, 4-1, in the state quarterfinals. Senior Shane Halaas and junior Michael Szmatula were named CHSL All-Catholic, senior Dane Muller and junior Nick Czinder were named CHSL All-League, and senior Andrew Cloonan was named CHSL All-Academic. Senior Shane Halaas was named 2nd Team All-State, 2nd Team All-Area, and All-County Honorable Mention. Five Eaglet seniors were named All-State Academic: Maxwell Borchers, Andrew Cloonan, Maxwell Oslund, Matthew Uhrin, and Player of the Year Jordan Kieltyka (4.3 GPA). Kieltyka is the fourth Eaglet to be named as All-State Academic Player of the Year since 2004.

The Eaglet skiers enjoyed another successful season, going 7-2 in dual meets, finishing second in the Divisional, third in the Catholic League Championship, 8th in the Regional Championship, and 7th in the SEMSL Championships. — The Boys of Summer –

It became a tale of two seasons for Coach Nick Di Ponio's Varsity Baseball Eaglets, a talented squad with mostly sophomores and juniors. Outside the Catholic League Central Division, St. Mary's was 7-4, and in league play, 5-15. The Eaglets put it all together to win their seventh consecutive District title by shutting out Bloomfield Hills Andover, 7-0, after beating Notre Dame Prep, 3-2, in eight innings in the semifinal game. In the Regional Tournament, the Eaglets beat Richmond, 10-1, and St. Clair Shores Lakeshore, 4-3, to advance to the Division 2 Ouarterfinals against Detroit Country Day, whom they defeated 10-3. As the ORCHARD LAKE GOOD NEWS went to press, St. Mary's advances to the Division 2 Championships at Battle Creek.

After winning the CHSL AA Division in 2008, the Eaglets were moved up to the Central Division in 2009. Match victories were harder to come by, but the Eaglets more than held their own against the Warriors, Shamrocks, Cubs, and Pilots. The Eaglets finished third in the Catholic League Championship, but senior Alex Zanetti garnered medalist honors by shooting 70. St. Mary's finished sixth in the Oakland County Championship, and after taking some time off, had four golfers shoot under-80 to win the District Championship. A second at the Regional put the Eaglets into the Division 2 State Tournament, where after tied for second on day one, ended up finishing seventh. Senior Alex Zanetti capped a great season by capturing the state individual title.





— Track & Field —

After a winless but competitive dual meet season, the Eaglet Track squad finished second in the Catholic League Championships, and won its regional title. At the Division 2 State Championships, the team finished 16th. Tayler Peruski finished third in the 400M to be named All-State. Rodney Woodland finished fifth in the 100M and eighth in the 200M after winning both events in the regional. The 800M Relay team (Rodney Woodland, Gary Hunter, Robert Bolden, and Tayler Peruski) ran a season-best 1:30.48 to finish seventh. Tayler Peruski broke his school record in the 400M with a time of 48.9 against Catholic Central.

Peruski ran a 1:59.0 (season best) for second, and 3 1/2 seconds slower than his school record.

It was an upset no one expected. Peruski, who finished third in the Division 2 State Chamiophiships in the 400M, has been named All-State.

Spring 2009 Sports Recap

-Lax-

After finishing 10-9 in 2008, the Eaglets were primed for a better season, and broke from the gate quickly, winning eight of their first nine games, and then barely lost to Brother Rice by one. The Eaglets' only losses were to CHSL Central Division teams, and entered the state playoffs seeded No. 1 in their region. Second year coach Greg Normand preached speed and pressure on offense, and lock-down defense to go with steady goaltending. Advancing to the Division 2 state semifinals for the first time since 2004, the Eaglets beat Grand Rapids Forest Hills Central, 13-12, in OT. In the Division 2 State Championship for the first time since 1998, the Eaglets never trailed in

the game, but allowed East Grand Rapids to tie the game late to send the game into overtime. In the overtime period, St. Mary's had two chances to win stopped by the Pioneer goalie, and then with 1:36 left, the Pioneers scored the championship goal for their third consecutive title. St. Mary's loses 12 seniors, but returns a core of underclassmen that contributed heavily to this season's success.

POLISH PANORAMA IN ITS 25TH YEAR

The *Polish Panorama* in the Fr. Andrew Wotta Center officially opened on February 14, 1985, as a major part of the Orchard Lake Schools Centennial Celebrations. The late Leo A.(H'66) and Bernice Obloy were the principal benefactors of the project. Others who contributed were joined by the late William(H'80) and Mary(H'85) Lyons, the late Robert(H'76) and Joan Slavsky, Richard(H '85) and Theresa Mazur, Joseph and Mrs. Knott, Stanley(H'60) and Nina Krajewski, and Frank(P'28) and the late Mary Padzieski.

The *Polish Panorama* is a moving diorama of the history of Poland with one figure following another on an automated system. Each 30-inch high figure is clothed in an authentic costume. Completion required hundreds of hours in research and sewing. In Poland, Zbigniew Baran directed the design and production, then later supervised the construction of the motorized set.

For 25 years, the *Polish Panorama* has brought its viewers a broader consciousness of the faith, courage, and indestructibility of the Polish nation. The presentation dramatizes the history of Poland from its early beginnings, which are shrouded in legend, through modern world events, including the election of Pope John Paul II and the subsequent rise of the Solidarity movement.

The *Panorama's* 106 characters are drawn from the struggles of writers, peasants, saints, statesmen, soldiers, and artists who were passionate about remaining faithful to the ideals of Catholicism and the Christianity of the Polish nation. Their story, extended by immigrants to America in the 20th Century, is indispensable to understanding the impact of Poland on the modern world.



Polish Mission Staff and Volunteers Refine Organization Of OLS Rare Book Collections

Since September 2008, the Polish Library and Polish Rare Book Collection staff and volunteers have been working on a massive project: the organization of books that have been stored for decades in many obscure nooks and crannies of our historic campus. With an abundance of volunteer hours, to date more than 800 boxes — about 20,000 books — have been collected, processed, and readied for transport to the Adam Cardinal Maida Alumni Library. These 20,000 books have come from 25 different rooms in three separate buildings. Staff reports there are nearly 20 rooms whose books still need


collection. This work describes the first phase of the Rare Book Collection project.

Once the books from the remaining 20 rooms are packed and brought to the Library, they will be checked against the Orchard Lake Schools existing catalog. At that point, new titles will be added to enhance the main Library's offerings. With the Adam Cardinal Maida Alumni Library catalog available for research online, even more of the Orchard Lake Schools' important resources will become available to campus scholars and those interested in their contents from anywhere in the world.

She visited the OLS Polish and Rare Book Collections and prepared an official, detailed report, which will be offered to interested organizations who are curious about the condition of collections housed at OLS. OLS Polish Mission Director Marcin Chumiecki remarked, "The Polish Mission has continued to benefit from the support of the Polish Ministry of Culture and especially from Joanna's recent visit."

AMERICAN POLISH ENGINEERS LEARN ABOUT ARCHIVAL TECHNOLOGY

On March 18, 2009, Marcin Chumiecki, Director of the Polish Mission at the Orchard Lake Schools, was the featured speaker at the American Polish Engineering Association's (APEA) General Membership Meeting, held at the American Polish Cultural Center in Troy, Michigan. Chumiecki gave a presentation, entitled *Archiving Your Treasures*, focusing on the proper preservation and storage of treasured articles, photographs, and heirloom keepsakes for viewing and appreciation by future generations. He also provided information on methods for tracing a person's genealogy. Paul Ostrowski, a member of the Orchard Lake Schools Board of Regents, as well as a member of APEA, introduced Chumiecki to his fellow engineers.





PARI AND ITS DIRECTOR SEARCH FOR POLISH ROOTS

The Polonica Americana Research Institute (PARI) a new department of the OLS Polish Mission, has been created to serve family historians as they document their Polish heritage. The PARI department operates under the direction of Certified Genealogist Certified Genealogist Certified Genealogist Mendt-Jensen.

Author, educator, and researcher, and native Detroiter, Wendt-Jensen is a board member of Polish Genealogical Society of Michigan. As such, she is their representative to the Federation of Genealogical Societies. Wendt-Jensen, a Michigan State University graduate, spent 30 years in K-12 education, pioneering the use of multimedia technology in the classroom. In 1998, she brought these skills to professional genealogy.

Wendt-Jensen's interest in her Polish ancestry began when she interviewed her father, Frank Wendt (Wenta), as part of an elementary school project. He showed her the birth certificate carried by her grandfather for his passage to America. Months later, her father's untimely death inspired her to continue her research to discover her family's origins. Research revealed that her maternal and paternal ancestors arrived in Detroit in the 1880s from the Prussia, Posen, Galicia, and Russian regions of Poland. In the late 1890s, her family was helped by OLS Founder Fr. Józef Dąbrowski. Fr. Dąbrowski assisted grandmother Cecilia Wojtkowiak-Przytulska and her paternal aunt, Zofia Zdziebko, cousin Louise Wilmowitz (who would become Sr. Mary Electa OSF,) and others. All were half orphans or inmates at the Guardian Angel Home

on the corner of St. Aubin and Canfield. Wendt-Jensen's Aunt Katherine Wojtkowiak-Topolewski told her of Fr. Dąbrowski's demonstration at school of the electricity he had installed. The students gathered round a single light-bulb. When he flipped the switch, they all shouted "*Elektryka!*"

Wendt-Jensen's has documented her ancestry to the 1600s and has become a featured international speaker. She shares her vision of bringing Polish genealogy to the mainstream to guide ten million Polish-Americans to the knowledge of their roots. She presents information dispelling the myth that records were destroyed during the World Wars and that language barriers make research impossible. She has successfully conducted research in Poland at libraries, civil and diocesan archives, as well as in local Polish parishes.

Articles by Wendt-Jensen have appeared in *National Genealogical Societies Magazine, Ancestry Magazine, FEEFHS Journal, Polish Genealogical Society of Michigan's Polish Eaglet,* and online with *Gen Dobry.* Three titles, *Detroit's Polonia (2005), Detroit's Mount Elliott Cemetery (2006),* and *Detroit's Mount Olivet Cemetery (2006)* have been released by Arcadia Publishing. She has collaborated on the DVD production of *Our Polish Story (2007),* and is the 2008 recipient of the Michigan Genealogical Council's Lucy Mary Kellogg Award and the MTU Archives and Copper Country Historical Collections 2008 Research Travel Award.

collaborated with their occupants. Instead they paid the ultimate price: their beloved country ceased to exist on the political map. However, Poland's sons and daughters continued the fight on every European battlefront and in Africa.

Seventy years ago mankind started what became the bloodiest and most merciless war ever. It was a war that claimed millions of victims, a war that changed political, economical, and social systems forever. It left scar on the human race that may not heal for centuries.

WWII began on September 1, 1939 in Poland, the first country that stood up to an invasion by Nazi Germany. Poland was also attacked by

Soviet Russia – yet she defended herself for 37 days, the longest resistance to the Nazis in Europe. The Poles never surrendered and never

In this, it was the only allied nation who fought for its right to exist for six years — the entire length of the war on the European front.

The Orchard Lake Schools have maintained seven museums on campus related to World War II. These museums hold survivors' oral histories (analog), art work, diaries, documents, arms, photos, maps, uniforms, and related ephemera.

On September 4-6, 2009, as part of the *Orchard Lake Schools Anniversary* events, the Polish Mission will commemorate the *70th Anniversary of the Invasion of Poland* by honoring the brave Poles who fought for freedom. The honorees include members of the Polish Home Army, the Polish Air Force, and General Anders' 2nd Polish Corps, who captured Monte Cassino in Italy, as well as the Polish American soldiers who fought on the Eastern and Western Fronts,

as well as in the Mediterranean and the Pacific Ocean Theaters of the War. Michigan is home to veterans from each of the fighting units — the Polish Mission has confirmed their attendance at the commemoration event.

The Polish Mission will also present a lecture and exhibit of the artwork of Jan Komski (1915 -2002), a retired *Washington Post* artist who, during five years of World War II, survived five concentration camps in Poland and Germany. In 1949, after four years in displaced-persons camps in Germany, Komski emigrated to the United States. He continued painting and drawing until shortly before his death, producing art scenes of death, barbed wire torture, brutality, and starvation from the concentration camp years, 1940-45. His work has been displayed at the Auschwitz Memorial Museum in Poland and at Holocaust Memorial Shows in Houston and Chicago. Some of Komski's art makes up the Orchard Lake Polish Mission collection.

The following month, as part of *National Polish Heritage Month*, the Polish Mission will present a lecture and pictorial history showing the grounds of Orchard Lake using vintage pieces from the Polish Mission Archives and the Greater West Bloomfield Historical Society. The lecture, scheduled for Friday, October 2, 2009, will begin with the history of the Michigan Military Academy and end with a salute to the priest alumni of SS. Cyril & Methodius Seminary and the parishes they established.

MICHIGAN HUMANITIES COUNCIL AWARDS \$15,000 GRANT TO POLISH MISSION

Chancellor Fr. Timothy Whalen has announced that the Polish Mission at the Orchard Lake Schools is the proud recipient of \$15,000 to support two key programs coming up in September and October, 2009: 1) the Polish Mission's Commemoration of 1 September 1939 and, 2) the Polish Mission's 100th Anniversary event, A Celebration of SS Cyril & Methodius Seminary 1909-2009.

The funds will be used by the Polish Mission to increase community awareness of Poland's suffering and strength during World War II and to spotlight SS. Cyril & Methodius Seminary's 100th Anniversary at Orchard Lake, its alumni, and their accomplishments. The grant will also fund the creation of a publication and special events, featuring museum holdings, which were created for public display by Polish war veterans, who arrived in

Michigan as displaced persons and lived their post-war lives locally in Wayne, Oakland, and Macomb Counties.

The Michigan Humanities Council awards National Endowment for the Humanities grants to Michigan nonprofit organizations. The Polish Mission at Orchard Lake received the news in early May 2009.

wenty-eight years ago, when I graduated from St. Mary's Preparatory, I never could have dreamed that I would be doing something as personally appealing and enthralling as this: I have officially begun working for our Alma Mater.

My role at the Orchard Lake Schools (OLS) is a bit unusual. Not only I am responsible for financial operations and accounting, I am responsible for directing Development and Alumni Relations, as well. As such, I am anticipating the opportunity to participate as fully as possible in the celebrations of our 100th Year on the Shores of Orchard Lake in 2009, and in 2010, our 125th Anniversary of the OLS founding by Fr. Joseph Dabrowski in Detroit in 1885. I am experiencing the unique blessing of being in a position to help our Alma Mater.

So many years have passed by, just as so many young people have passed through the halls of the Orchard Lake Schools. We all have our memories of the many days we spent on this beautiful campus.

I can remember my first official week on campus. It began on Sunday, August 14, 1977, when my parents brought my oldest brother and me to campus for football practice, which at the time was called, *hellweek*. My dream had come true. I couldn't believe that I was really practicing with guys I had been watching from the sidelines for the past two years – guys who had become my heroes. This was the first time that I had ever formally practiced football and in those days, during *hellweek*, practice was three times each day. It was a lot to ask of a 14-year-old. Needless to say, I didn't last very long. On my second day, during the second practice, a big senior, starting

lineman, Jim Rozycki, rolled on my thumb and broke it. I was in pain and devastated.

My start at St. Mary's was not what I had envisioned. Thinking I let my oldest brother down, I was really hurting inside as well. Then, to make matters worse, on my way to the hospital, the radio announcer said, "The King had died." Later, I learned that my brother was

more upset about losing Elvis, than about my thumb. Back then, my dad worked both day and night to find the money to send three of us to Orchard Lake. My mother never drove, and till this day, still does not. One of the assistants drove me to the hospital, where I had x-rays taken and was fitted with a plaster cast. Afterward, we headed back to Orchard Lake for the end of the second practice. By the grace of God, I can say that I had the fortitude to never miss attending a practice, even when I couldn't play. I remained on campus everyday and helped the team any way I could, until weeks later I was cleared for football. It turned out that the 1977 OLSM Football Season was an incredible success — we won our school's first-ever, state football championship. At the State Championship Game at the Pontiac Silverdome, I played quarterback the entire fourth quarter.

Today, 32 years later, I am back at Orchard Lake. So many things have changed since I was a student here, and yet many have also remained the same. Even

though there are new buildings, new faces, and

new uniforms, Dombrowski Fieldhouse is still the same, as are Msgrs. Ziemba (P'44, C'47), Milewski (P'47, C'51), and Koper (P'63, C'67) — and Fr. Jim Mazurek (C'69). They're all still here and going strong —after all those years. How could I forget Robin Goddard (C'80)? Everyone enrolled at St. Mary's since the late 70s remembers Robin.







Wawel Cathedral where John Paul II was ordained a priest and celebrated his first Mass, was also his cathedral as Archbishop of Kraków. Next, travel to the tomb of St. Faustina Kowalska, where we will *celebrate Mass and pray the Divine Mercy Novena*. Tour of the convent and the Basilica of the Divine Mercy, which was consecrated by the Servant of God John Paul II during his last trip to Poland. Dinner tonight on your own. *Remember: in Poland Friday is a day of abstinence but you can enjoy many good meatless dishes*. Overnight Kraków.

Saturday, October 17th

Kraków/ Wadowice/ Wieliczka/Kraków

In the morning, travel to Wadowice, the birthplace and hometown of Pope John Paul II. Visit his house, now a museum (*The house will be under renovation in 2009 and may be closed to visitors. Tour is pending confirmation.*) Celebrate our Mass in the Basilica of the Presentation of the Blessed Virgin Mary and see the baptismal font where John Paul II was baptized. Lunch on your own. Afterwards, continue on to the famous salt mine of Wieliczka, known for its beautiful and unique underground constructions made of salt. Then, return to hotel in Kraków, for some free time for shopping or relaxation. Tonight, dinner in the medieval-style restaurant, the "Chlopskie Jadlo". Overnight Kraków.




