

Student Union Building Under Construction

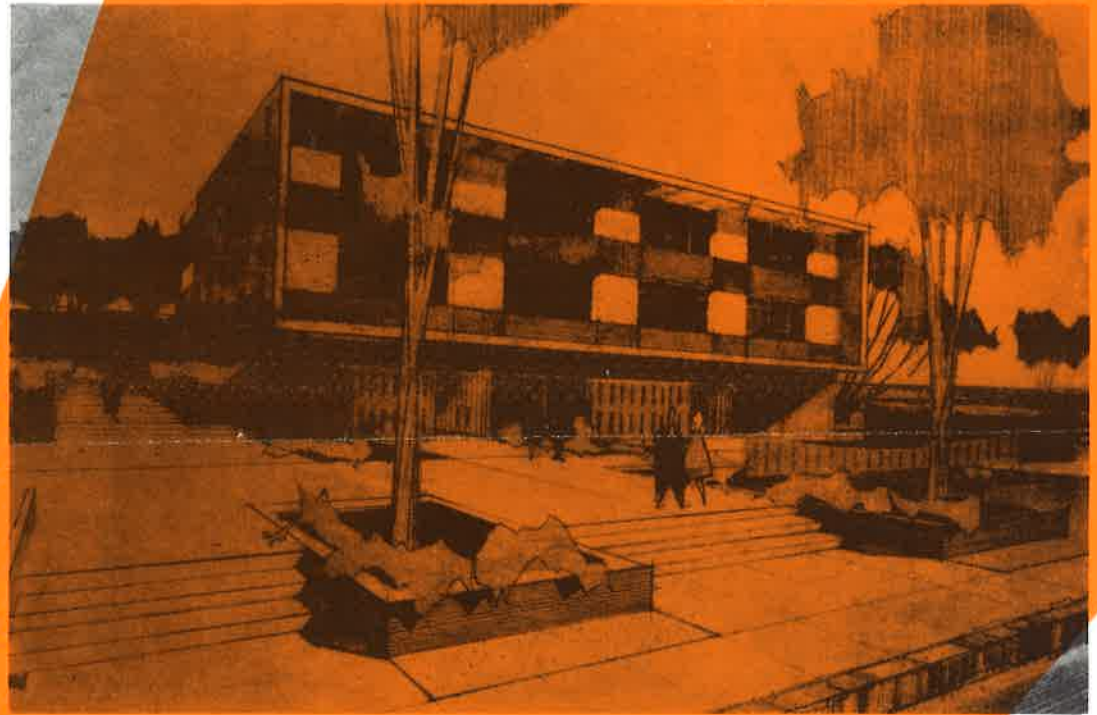
Ladies Associates Undertake Another Major Project

Ground has been broken for a new Student Union Building on the campus of Michigan Christian College. This much-needed structure has been in the planning stage for a long while.

Situated just east of the Multi-purpose building, it will have two floors below present campus-ground level facing on Lake Norcentra and, ultimately, two floors above campus-ground level facing south toward Avon Road. The Architect's drawing (right) is looking at it from the lake shore side.

As plans are now arranged, the Student Union Building will house on the lower level a Student Center; second level, the library; third level, the book store and faculty offices. Although original plans call for only three floors, changes in foundation plans are now being made in view of adding a fourth floor for class rooms and additional administrative offices.

Funds for the building in a

large part will be provide by the Ladies Associates of MCC, and by other projects and gifts.

The erection of this building will relieve over-crowded conditions in other areas which will allow provision for two more classrooms. This space is badly needed also as MCC accelerates its academic program.

MCC Campus Expanded to 98 Acres

Special — In a recent transaction between the Board of Directors of MCC and Mrs. Henry T. Gierok, the 54-acre estate which joins the present MCC campus became the property of the college.

The details of this transfer will be revealed soon in a special bulletin. However, it has

been announced that acquisition of the 54 acres came about through a cash payment plus an annuity arrangement. This annuity program is most reasonable and favors the college in a far greater way than a complete cash purchase or long term financing program could have.

Twelve of these participate in the missionary training program. This is a two-year program in which those being trained will, upon return to their homeland, be immediately more effective in the Lord's work since they will have no difficulty with the customs and language of their own people.
