PALMER HONORED WITH DOCTORS DEGREE

"THE PORTRAIT OF A MAN"

"Because of your commitment to Christian education, especially as a teacher at David Lipscomb College and as president of Nashville Christian Institute, Nigerian Christian College and Michigan Christian College:

"Because of your devotion to the Lord's work as a minister of the gospel and as a builder of churches;

"Because of your love for people of all races that led you to toil in foreign lands that souls might hear the Story of Redemption; and

"Because of your stature and character, "Oklahoma Christian College, by authorization of its Board of Trustees, is honored to bestow upon you the Degree of Doctor of Laws, with all the rights and privileges appertaining thereto."

Subsequently, upon the completion of the reading of these words, President E. Lucien Palmer received the degree which gives further recognition to the accomplishments, so far, in his life. Dr. James O. Baird represented Oklahoma Christian College in conferring the degree. This impressive ceremony was the climax of the Convocation on Sept. 28, 1969 which officially launched Michigan Christian College into its second decade of service to young people.

It is difficult to adequately portray a man who has never been too big or too small for any task which confronted him.



Unlike Shakespeare's King Lear, the Fred Lears want to serve rather than be served. They want to give to others rather than be given to. They are more interested in working that which is good than in receiving unmerited glory.

Carolyn and Fred Lear have a burning desire to help young people; or anyone else who needs it. They turn junk into "gold" and old newspapers into "silver" and the money is given to worthy causes. Recently, they took a sizeable contribution

out of their "kitty", as they call it, and gave toward the relief of the victims of Hurricane Camille and donated \$100 to the Strathmoor Church of Christ in Detroit for a special project.

The principal beneficiary, however, of the unlimited energy and generosity of this couple is Michigan Christian College. During the last 12 months, Fred and Carolyn Lear have transformed junk and old papers into more than \$1700 in cash. \$1600 of this has gone to Michigan Christian College in one form or another.

PRESIDENT PALMER HONORED WITH DOCTORS DEGREE

The desire to serve good causes has permitted him with dignity to assist Nigerian natives in clearing great areas of African bush to build schools and places of worship. Also, in humility and strength, to serve as the President of three Christian educational institutions.

Not in every instance has an honorary degree been indicative of work performed or honor due. But in Lucien Palmer's case the work he has performed and the leadership he has supplied in many fields of Christian endeavor cannot be adequately rewarded or recognized by a degree of any kind. His friends, however, are grateful to Oklahoma Christian College for this recognition of one of God's real men.

Born the eleventh child of Robert and Rebecca Palmer, he was reared in Central Florida. He gained business experience in the transportation division of the Atlantic Coast Line Railroad in Columbia, South Carolina from 1941-44. He attended David Lipscomb College and received the Bachelor's Degree and the Master's Degree in Education from George Peabody College. His college educational experience was embellished and interrupted by two tours in Africa as a missionary to Nigeria. Involved with him in this work was his wife, the former Ida Coates of High Springs, Florida and two children Edward L. and Patsy Jovce.

After his second tour in Africa he accepted the presidency of Nashville Christian Institute as the first white president of the all Black school, replacing his close friend Marshall Keeble. Willie Cato, who succeded Lucien Palmer as President of the Nashville Christian Institute, wrote the following of President Palmer. "While the tenure of Lucien Palmer at Nashville Christian Institute was short, the results lasted throughout the life of the Institute. Any transition can prove to be difficult; however, when Christians work together in the spirit of

Christ, many wonderful things take place. That is exactly what occured when Lucien Palmer came to N.C.I. It was he, working in the spirit of Christ, with the wonderful Christ-like spirit of Marshall Keeble, who made the transition between the black administration and the white administration of N.C.I. successful. The transition was smooth, pleasant and profitable in every way.

"Lucien Palmer made the way for those who followed after him much easier and continued to be a part of the spirit of N.C.I., as we looked to him for encouragement and guidance. All of us who followed after Lucien Palmer at N.C.I. shall ever be grateful for his Christian leadership and service."

In 1960 he and Marshall Keeble made an extensive tour of the Holy Land and Nigeria. Again in 1962, Dr. Palmer escorted Marshall Keeble on an around-the-world tour visiting missionaries in many places with special emphasis on countries in Africa. In 1966 he revisited Nigeria and through his influence with Paramount Chief Udo Ekong successfully negotiated a 99-year lease on 75 acres of land for the Nigerian Christian College at no cost to the college.

Roger Church, long time board member and Secretary of the African Christian Schools, Inc. (formerly Nigerian Christian Schools Foundation) said of Dr. Palmer: "Lucien Palmer was largely responsible for the beginning of the Nigerian Christian Schools Foundation in 1958. He served as our first President and has been a constant source of help and encouragement. Through his leadership we built the Nigerian Christian Secondary School in Ukpom, Nigeria in 1963 which now has an enrollment of about 550 students. I have known and loved brother Palmer and his family for more than a quarter of a century; and have been closely associated with him in Christian education work in West Africa since its very inception. Several of our faithful Board members are

laboring in this work of love as a direct result of Lucien Palmer's influence."

For eleven years, Lucien Palmer has been associated with Michigan Christian College. He came to the campus and worked nearly a year setting in motion all phases of the establishment of the college. He served as its first dean and its first vice president. With full approval of the MCC Board of Directors he, at the same time, served as President of the Nigerian Christian Schools and Nigerian Christian College. When Otis Gatewood resigned the MCC presidency in 1964, Dr. Palmer was the unanimous chioce of the Board of Trustees to succeed him.

MCC Board Chairman G. Wheeler Utley, who has served on the Board and as Chairman these eleven years said, "In my years of association with the great adventure in Christian education known as Michigan Christian College, I have enjoyed working with many good and great people. But none of them has stood taller than Lucien Palmer.

"This man has been an inspiration to us in courage, determination, stamina and capacity for accomplishment. He sets an example for all of us by his calm, pleasant, yet forceful and knowledgeable, approach to every situation and problem.

"Michigan Christian College is a montage of portions of many individual lives. But no one person's involvement and contribution approaches President Palmer's. The character and policies of the college reflect the image of this godly man more than any other force."

And so this "Portrait of a Man" remains unfinished. The capstone of his activity and influence can not yet be set in place. If the Lord wills, Lucien Palmer will touch other good works with his characteristic Christian commitment by which glory will be brought to the Master he serves, and the lives of many, regardless of age, race, or color will be blessed abundantly.

Alma Gatewood Memorial Dormitory Construction On Schedule - Ready for September, 1970 Opening

Presently, the Alma Gatewood Memorial Dormitory is about sixty percent complete. Construction was begun in plenty of time to assure completion prior to college opening in September, 1970.

The dormitory will house 144 women students and will be of the latest design for dormitory living. Two girls will share a room with private bath facilities between each suite of two rooms. It will also have laundry rooms on each floor and other features making the building not only beautiful but most servicable to those living in it.

Michigan Christian needs very much, of course, to fill this new dorm. In fact, President Palmer

and the entire administration views this as one of the most outstanding needs facing MCC. A most sincere invitation, therefore, is given to high school seniors to make their plans to come to MCC. Parents and friends are urged to assist in helping the college to enroll students to fill this new dorm and to keep full the existing dorms.

The Alma Gatewood Dorm has been talked about and planned for a long time and the Board of Directors have expressed a great faith in the present and future of Michigan Christian College in the decision to proceed at this time in the building of this large and beautiful new dormitory for women.
