



Student body completes MCC's twentieth year with bustling month

Mounting anticipation changed to cheers in chapel on April 17 as a tape recorded message proclaimed the occasion as Beautiful Day. Students piled into cars and the bus, then spent a sunny day at Bloomer State Park.

Hours of rehearsal, by approximately one half of the student body, climaxed in a three-evening presentation of Celebration in Song on April 19-21. Near-capacity crowds delighted in the program of musical numbers presented by the campus social clubs, A Capella Chorus, Celebration Singers, and the hosts and hostesses.

The Dean's Breakfast on April 21 provided an opportunity for faculty and sophomores to reflect on the times they had shared together. Royce Dickinson, former Vice President of MCC, presented the Baccaulareate message in the Westside Chapel on the evening of April 29, while recognition of outstanding students highlighted the annual Awards Banquet on the evening of May 4.

William Powers, an attorney from Troy, Michigan, addressed the eighty-five graduates. NCA consultant assists faculty in BRE development

Moving forward from the state approval of MCC's Bachelor of Religious Education program, the North Central Association recently sent Dr. Robert Watson to campus on two occasions to assist in a consultant capacity. Dr. Watson is a professor and chairman of the Religion Department of Hiram College in Hiram. Ohio.

On his first visit of February 4-5, Dr. Watson worked with the faculty in evaluating and refining the BRE curriculum. After his April 8-9 visit, he made further recommendations in the areas of facilities, finance, curriculum, faculty, library, and student services as each relates to the BRE program. He pointed out strengths and areas needing further attention as MCC seeks North Central accreditation for the four-year religious studies program. The College's current associate programs are accredited by North Central.



In Memorium John H. Hoover 1896-1979



John H. Hoover, known to his friends as Jack, became a part of the great history and heritage of the Lord's people in Michigan at his passing on May 7, 1979. He left a legacy of untiring love and devotion to what he held sacred and important.

Born October 5, 1896, in Woodberry, Tennessee, Jack provided leadership in various activities of the Chase Road Church of Christ in Dearborn. He and his wife, Sudie, were founding members of the Chase Road

congregation nearly fifty years ago.

Jack considered the opportunity to work with young people as one of the greatest blessings of his life. He regarded them as his "fountain of youth." He began serving on the MCC Board of Directors in 1965 and devoted inexhaustible efforts to MCC as Chairman of the Board since 1975. His weekly trips to visit the College were always an inspiration.

Jack is survived by his wife of fifty-one years, Sudie, and two aunts, Mrs. Lon Gossett of Pemberville, Ohio, and Mrs. Lucille Tanner of Nashville, Tennessee. Also, of great importance, he is survived by hundreds of young men and women of Michigan Christian College, whom he loved and helped as though they were his own.

MCC Bulletin.


