

Orientation, Special Chapel Open New Academic Year

Following a special early orientation program for new students and their parents, students from twenty-two states and seven foreign countries enrolled at Michigan Christian College for the fall semester. States represented include Alabama, Arkansas, Arizona, Connecticut, Florida, Georgia, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Maryland, Michigan, Minnesota, Mississippi, Missouri, New York, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Tennessee, Texas, Virginia, West Virginia, and Wisconsin.

Early orientation sessions began on August 21. While new students settled in their rooms and participated in informal sharing sessions, parents attended informative sessions about college life, finances, and their participation in the educational process. After an afternoon reception, the evening ended with a movie and bonfire devotional.




Allens, Bruces Honored at Parents' Day Luncheon

Doctorate Degrees Completed by Two English Instructors

Doctoral studies ended for Paul and Jeanine Varner on August 24 as the University of Tennessee conferred on each of them a Ph.D. in English. Mr. Varner's dissertation centered on the comic technique of George Colman the Elder, while Mrs. Varner compared the artistic relationship between Henry James and Gustav Flaubert.

The Varners each received Bachelors' degrees from Oklahoma Christian College and Masters' degrees from the University of Tennessee before coming to MCC. They have been teaching English composition and literature at MCC since 1978.
