Gene Stallings to be Featured Speaker at Partnership Dinner XII



Partnership Dinner XII is scheduled for the evening of May 14, 1983 at Cobo Hall in Detroit. Gene Stallings, defensive backfield coach of the Dallas Cowboys professional football team, is this year's featured speaker. Ticket prices will remain at \$65.00 each.

"The Partnership Dinner is so vital to our continued growth," states President Milton B. Fletcher. "We appreciate the oustanding support of so many people each year." As in the past, proceeds from the dinner will continue to reduce the debt on the Alma Gatewood Memorial Residence Hall.

In addition to inspiring remarks by Stallings, plans for this year's event include a performance by the MCC A Capella Chorus, congregational singing of favorite hymns, the Alumnus of the Year presentation and a special honor to Gerald Montgomery.

Coach Stallings has been with the highly regarded Dallas Cowboys' organization since 1972. He joined the Cowboys following seven years as head coach of his alma mater Texas A&M. Gene was an All-Southwest Conference Receiver at A&M under Bear Bryant. He was tricaptain of Bryant's undefeated 1956 Aggie team. Stallings served one year as a student-assistant coach at A&M before moving with Bryant to Alabama as an assistant. He remained there until returning to A&M as head coach in 1965.

Gene, a native of Paris, Texas, and his wife, Ruth Ann, have five children — Anna Lee, Laurie, John Mark, Jacklyn, and Martha Kate. He is a member of the Prestoncrest Church of Christ in Dallas, Texas.

Computer, Word Processing, Accounting, General Business Degree Plans to be Offered This Fall

Students desiring to receive an occupational degree which prepares them for immediate employment after two years of college will have four new options available to them at Michigan Christian College this fall. Based upon strong student interest, the college will begin offering Associate in Applied Science degrees in Computer Science Information Systems, Word Processing, Accounting, and General Business.

The Computer Science program will include seven special-

The Computer Science program will include seven specialized computer courses as well as a core of selected business courses. The target job market for students trained in this program will be retail businesses, governmental agencies, insurance companies, banks, manufacturing firms, and data processing offices which need someone who understands the business applications of computer programming. A new computer lab, which will tie in to the college's powerful Wang VS-80 system, will be installed

this summer.

Word Processing majors will receive eleven credit hours of specialized training on state-of-the-art word processing equipment in addition to a strong

base of secretarial and business courses. Modernization and strengthening of MCC's current secretarial degrees will also be made possible by the addition of this program.

Students pursuing the Accounting option will be preparing for positions in the accounting departments of small businesses and for support positions in larger firms in both financial and manufacturing accounting. The program includes financial, as well as cost and tax accounting.

The General Business program will feature a broad curriculum of business courses which will provide the student with an edge on the job market in business firms. It will also provide valuable background for those desiring to manage a family business.

Although many of the new courses being added to the MCC curriculum are designed for the Applied Science degrees, students pursuing four-year degrees will also benefit from the larger selection of courses. Further information about any of the new programs may be obtained from the Admissions Office.

"I have been in groups, to lectures, marriage conferences, etc., but never have I experienced such exposure to so much real workable material given by two men with such a special gift of speaking," commented one seminar participant. Audiences all over the country are benefitting from the work and ideas presented by these two talented

The ten-hour seminar is designed to enrich, strengthen, and vitalize the marriage relationship. Each participant registers and pays a fee of \$20 for a single or \$25 for a couple.

Dr. Carl Brecheen has taught the very popular "Family Relations" course at ACU since 1961. He completed work for two Masters Degrees, and earned a doctorate in religious education. Dear Friends:

One of the many things I continually appreciate is the dedication of our faculty. Recently, under the leadership of Dr. Larry Jurney, Academic Dean, a faculty New Programs Committee put together a proposal outlining a new Associate in Applied Science Degree featuring majors in Computer Science Information Systems, Word Processing, Accounting, and General Business. The committee was staffed by Mr. Charles Babb, Mrs. Barbara Cole, Dr. Larry Jurney, and Mr. Larry Stewart. These Associate in Applied Science degrees will be offered beginning with the 1983-84 school year. The committee also recommended a new Associate in Science degree designed to adequately prepare students who plan to move on to a four year college and seek a Bachelors degree in Computer Science.

This New Programs Committee did an outstanding job. I received their proposal in December and we made our first presentation to a prospective donor on December 15, 1982. Since then we have been able to generate \$69,000 in commitments against a total cost package of \$126,398. The cost figure includes the new equipment needed, additional library purchases, renovation costs, and the first year's operating expenses. We are delighted to let you know that \$44,600 of the amount committed has already been received.

As you may know, a December issue of *Time* magazine declared the computer as "The 1982 Man of the Year". Without a doubt, the "computer age" is upon us! We are very pleased to announce these new degree offerings in response to the needs of students who come to MCC attempting to prepare themselves for a life of service.

Committee of 25 Plans Silver Anniversary

Silver Anniversary celebration activities were the topic of the January 28 meeting of the Committee of 25. As previously decided, no extra activities will be planned in conjunction with the twenty-fifth year; however, the silver anniversary theme will be a major part of most events.

President Milton B. Fletcher brought everyone up to date on the four new Associate in Applied Science degree programs. He emphasized how this should greatly strengthen the academic courses being offered as the college begins its twenty-fifth year.

LaJuana Gill is the recipient of the \$100 first place prize for designing the official twenty-fifth anniversary logo. Her entry was judged to be the best in overall design, adaptability, and expressing the feeling of MCC's twenty-five years of service. Gale Edwards, chairperson of the Logo Committee, announced the award.

Nine Workshop Dates Announced

Dates have been announced for nine Bible School Workshops and Christian Education Sundays. Jesse Clayton, Director of Development, oversees the planning of these sessions.

March 26-27 the workshop will be conducted at the Cardinal Drive Church in Chicago, Illinois. April 30-May 1 will find the workshop at the Mt. Clemens, Michigan Congregation.

Flanders Road is sponsoring the event in Toledo, Ohio on May 22-23. June 4-5 are the dates of the Rochester, New York workshop. September 24-25 is the weekend of the Medina, Ohio workshop.

Three weekend workshops in October are scheduled: October 8-9 at Bristol Road in Flint, Michigan; October 15-16 at Southside in Terre Haute, Indiana; and October 29-30 at the Detroit Northwest Church.

Workshop participants will travel to Valparaiso, Indiana November 12-13, and round out the year's activities at the North Park Church in Rockford, Illinois on December 3-4.

Associates President Gwen Orr reported on plans to inaugurate a Twenty-Fifth Anniversary Plate much as was done for the tenth anniversary.

Randy Coss, Alumni Associate Vice President, shared plans to have a special fundraising drive within the Association. He also mentioned that initial work has begun to prepare publication of the first Alumni Directory. Plans are to have this available during the Silver Anniversary year.

The college Men's Club is planning to incorporate the twenty-fifth anniversary theme in its Spring 1984 Jog-Rama.

Larry Stewart was commissioned to continue his work on the history of Michigan Christian College.

Rotary Supports New Degree Programs

Five hundred dollars has been contributed so far this year by the Rotary Club of Auburn Heights, Michigan to help support the new business degree programs at Michigan Christian College.

President Karl Dale and the Rotarians are providing vital assistance to help MCC grow as they make this money available to help purchase a printer for the new computer lab. The amount contributed represents twenty percent of the organization's entire specific charities budget.

The club, which meets every Monday at the Silver Dome, is celebrating twenty five years of community service. One of the group's major project areas is scoliosis screening. Dr. Larry Jurney, MCC Academic Dean, is treasurer of the organization.

Rochester Businessmen Support MCC

Fifteen area businessmen met with President Milton B. Fletcher and several members of the Michigan Christian College staff February 17 in the campus Gold Room. The meeting was planned to get the input of Rochester business leaders concerning a fund-raising campaign among the area business community.

"Dating from the fall of 1959 through the current fiscal year, ending May 31, 1983, capital and operational expenditures by Michigan Christian College have amounted to approximately \$33,000,000," stated President Fletcher. "That figure does not include amounts of monies spent personally by students in the Rochester area, which, over a 24-year period, would be quite sizeable. Looking

at the contributions of Michigan Christian College, we believe it is logical to approach the business community through a campaign effort."

A campaign plan was proposed and readily accepted by those present. Several businessmen spoke of the good impact they believe MCC has had on the community.

"I couldn't be more pleased with the outcome of our first meeting," said President Fletcher. "The men that we met with seem to want to work and help us raise some money for the school."

After more ground work is laid, the Rochester Business Community campaign will begin early in September, 1983 and continue throughout that month.

Self-Study Prepared for North Central

A self-study report of the academic program at Michigan Christian College was presented to the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools on February 17. Members of the Academic Committee completed the self-study in preparation for the campus visit by the NCA accrediting team April 17-20.




Whitwell is married to the former Carol Blackburn (Class of 1962) and they have two children.

"Based on improved collections, our current MCC students and future students will still be able to get NDSL funds even though government funds will decrease. This condition necessitates our most urgent effort ever to have a campus representative to help former borrowers through their loan repayment," explained Kent Hoggatt, Director of Financial

McClure noted that the greatest difficulty he faces in tracing delinquent accounts is a lack of accurate addresses, particularly those involving name changes. Former students with NDSL account balances are asked to cooperate by updating their mailing status with the college. Alumni may call the Collection Office at 313-651-5361.

Most Students Receive Financial Assistance

Despite misconceptions about the effect of federal and state budget cuts upon financial aid, most students continue to receive help with college expenses. Figures released by Kent Hoggatt, MCC Director of Financial Aid, reveal that \$906,451 in financial aid has been awarded to MCC students for the 1982-83 academic year.

The average financial aid package for full-time students is over \$3,000. This average covers over two-thirds of the expenses for a full-time boarding student. However, those meeting early aid application deadlines are receiving both the largest and the best aid packages, consisting of larger proportions of grant aid.
