Board selects Dr. Kenneth Johnson to serve as sixth president of MCC

Partnership Dinner XX provided an ideal opportunity for Board Chairman Royce Dickinson to publicly announce the selection of Dr. Kenneth Johnson as the sixth president of Michigan Christian College. Chairman Dickinson introduced Dr. Johnson to an audience of approximately 1,400 friends of the college at the May 4 benefit dinner.

The Board of Trustees began the selection process last October with the appointment of a Presidential Search Committee composed of Bob Benham, Norm Christman, Royce Dickinson, Jack Duty, Howard Hagerman, Annette Riley, and Bob Utley. Over the next five months, the committee considered over thirty candidates.

At the April 20 board meeting, the search committee presented a recommendation that Dr. Kenneth Johnson be selected as the next president. Committee Chairman Bob Utley stated, "The committee was impressed with Dr. Johnson's credentials, his stated approach to the job, and the fine recommendations received from several

well-known college leaders in the brotherhood." He continued, "It was felt that he was the person who would have the expertise and the qualities to continue the progress that MCC had experienced over the past ten years under President Milton B. Fletcher."

Following graduation from Harding College in 1966, Dr. Johnson spent ten years in business, eventually serving as a partner in a Searcy accounting firm. During those years, he completed a master's degree at the University of Wisconsin, spent a year in fund-raising efforts for Harding, and began teaching part-time in the Harding School of Business.

In 1976, Dr. Johnson began full-time employment with Harding University. While serving as director of the accounting program, he completed a D.B.A. in accounting at Louisiana Tech University in 1981. During his tenure at Harding, his division grew until it became the largest single program on campus.


Upon leaving Harding in 1986, Dr. Johnson founded a

multi-state, specialty-service, CPA firm, based in Searcy. The firm has grown rapidly under his leadership to become one of the top twenty CPA firms in Arkansas.

When leaving Harding, Dr. Johnson and his wife, Mary, made a commitment to return to service in Christian education after the high school graduation of their daughters, Kimberly and Rebecca. The youngest daughter's graduation coincided perfectly with the opening of the presidency of Michigan Christian College, which Dr. Johnson described as an "opportunity to be involved in shaping the lives and dreams and goals of Christian youth."

In addition to his work with Christian education, Dr. Johnson has served as a deacon of the College Church of Christ since 1984. He has taught Bible classes on a regular basis, chaired the congregation's Finance Committee, conducted home Bible studies, and served as a member of the congregation's long-range planning committee.

Growing up in Iowa as the son of a Midwestern preacher, Dr.

Johnson has maintained an intense interest in mission efforts. While teaching at Harding, he organized annual student trips to Philadelphia and Minneapolis in order to encourage students to pursue careers in those mission areas. After returning from an Australian mission campaign in 1985, he initiated a campaign program to take College church teens to mission points outside of the Bible Belt. Among the aims of his administration at Michigan Christian College, Dr. Johnson lists his desire "to encourage Christian youth to develop a personal commitment to lifelong learning, to responsible citizenship, and to evangelical, undenominational Christianity.'

Discussing his role as the president of Michigan Christian College, Dr. Johnson described his task at the college as one in which he would "continue sensible, stable progress by coordinating the expansion of her academic programs, her enrollment, her faculty, and her financial base." He also expressed a keen desire "to encourage Bible study and fellowship among churches of Christ in the North Central states." He concluded by sharing his vision of Michigan Christian College as an "academically excellent, financially sound, modestly endowed, four-year college."

MCC awards first counseling degrees

Marking a milestone with the addition of another four-year program, Michigan Christian College awarded its first Bachelor of Religious Education degrees with majors in counseling at the thirty-first annual graduation exercises. Two students, Angela Hazel of Pontiac, Michigan, and Debi Shauver of Fort Wayne, Indiana, received the first degrees with the new major at the May 4 ceremony.

Graduation ceremonies opened with the traditional processional, performed by Bernard Leshley of the music faculty. Bill Lytle, father of Lisa Patrico of Rochester Hills, led the audience in prayer. After congratulatory remarks by Royce Dickinson, chairman of the MCC Board of Trustees, the A Cappella Chorus performed three numbers.

Beth Blake of Littleton, Colorado, addressed the audience as valedictorian of her class. She reflected upon similar memories that her parents shared as members of the pioneer class. Lisa Patrico gave the salutatory address.

Bob Utley, a member of the MCC Board of Trustees, addressed graduates as the commencement speaker. Bob is the president of Utley Brothers, Inc., a specialty printer. He serves as an elder of the Rochester Church of Christ and has been an active supporter of the college since its inception. Two of Bob's grandsons, Andy Harrison of Rochester Hills, and Edward Utley of San Antonio, Texas, were members of the graduating class.

As President Milton B. Fletcher and Dean Leonard Knight conferred degrees upon the graduates, most received one of three associate degrees offered by Michigan Christian College. A majority of 69% received the

Associate in Arts degree, 20% the Associate in Science, and 11% the Associate in Applied Science.

In addition to graduates in the counseling program, five students received the Bachelor of Religious Education degree with majors in Christian ministry. Those students included Jon Fulton of Auburn Hills, Michigan; John Qualls of Houston, Texas; Pete Sexton of Attica, Michigan; Geneva Sparks of Detroit, Michigan; and Paul Yoder of Almont, Michigan.

After the hooding of graduates by parents and friends, Joe Bentley, director of the A Cappella Chorus, led the audience as they sang the Alma Mater. Ed Berta, a 1964 graduate of MCC and father of Penny Berta of Marquette, Michigan, led the audience in prayer before the recessional.

Count of students over age 25 continues to grow

Representing 18% of the total student body, an increasing number of students over age 25 continued to make an even greater impact upon student life at Michigan Christian College during the past academic year.

The class of 1991 included three senior citizens who completed degrees through the aid of a free-tuition policy offered by MCC to students over age 55. John Qualls, a minister, and Geneva Sparks, a retired secretary, completed the Bachelor of Religious Education degree. Fay Hoshell, a retired nurse, earned the Associate in Applied Science degree.

When asked why he decided to return to college, John stated that the opportunity to complete a degree "fulfilled a dream." Geneva remarked. Geneva remarked, "After taking early retirement, I needed something to do." Fay chose to attend MCC because of the availability of Bible courses and the tuition policy.

When considering a return to the classroom, adult students often are anxious about their ability to handle study demands. John did not find that

adjustment difficult. "The main thing was scheduling it as any other part of my work load and giving it proper priority." Fay admitted that "it was difficult only when I allowed myself to get behind."

All three students treasure special memories from their relationships with other students. John described his counseling class as a "crowning experience", in which he and class members related to one another and grew in a manner that was "nothing short of phenomenal." Geneva recalled the rewarding experience of watching another

adult student complete courses due to her encouragement. Fay, who lived in a residence hall, described the younger students as "confidents and friends." Each adult student touched the lives of other Michigan Christian College students as they were touched.

State extends MCC day-care license

Following reinspection by the Michigan Department of Social Services, the Child Development Center of Michigan Christian College recently received a two-year license for continuation of their day-care services.

The center opened last December with the normal six-month provisional license that the state issues to new centers.

The Child Development Center passed its inspection with no program citations. Marian

Dannis, a state licensing consultant, commended the center for exceptional interaction between student employees and the children. She was impressed by the loving attitude demonstrated by the college students. Most student employees are enrolled in either the child care or early childhood programs.

In July, Lesta Grear will join the professional staff of the Child Development Center. Lesta has directed the preschool program of Luckett Christian Academy in Royal Oak for the past six years. She will serve as the new assistant director. along with Debi Hoggatt, director of the MCC center.

During the summer months, the Child Development Center plans to concentrate on improvements in the playground area. Workers are scheduled to add gravel to selected areas of the playground and to install a swing set and a playhouse, which also will serve as a storage area for outdoor equipment.

Featured Speakers

Mike Cope. Currently serving as minister of the College Church of Christ in Searcy, Arkansas, Mike Cope will begin preaching for the Highland Church of Christ in Abilene, Texas, in September. He has authored two books and is the managing editor of 21st Century Christian. He holds degrees from Harding University and the Harding Graduate School of Religion.

Jack Duty. Preaching in Ohio and West Virginia before moving to Michigan in 1976, Jack Duty now serves as minister of the Clawson Church of Christ. He is the co-executive director of the Blue Ridge Encampment, serves on the MCC Board of Trustees, and has taught selected courses for MCC on several occasions. He graduated from Kent State University and is currently completing a graduate degree at Abilene Christian University.

Steve Eckstein. Thirty-three years of teaching for the Bible Chair of Eastern New Mexico University adds tremendous depth to Dr. Steve Eckstein's classroom presentations. He joined the Bible faculty of Michigan Christian College in 1986 and speaks on a regular basis throughout the nation. Dr. Eckstein holds degrees from Harding University, Eastern New Mexico University, and Texas Tech University.

Ian Fair. Now serving as a professor of Bible and dean of the College of Biblical Studies at Abilene Christian University, Dr. Ian Fair spent fourteen years as a missionary in South Africa and four years as dean and an instructor of the Sunset School of Preaching before moving to Abilene in 1978. Dr. Fair received degrees from Abilene Christian University and the University of Natal in South Africa.

Birgie Houston. Formerly the assistant dean of student life at Pepperdine University and an administrative assistant at the University of Iowa Foundation, Birgie Houston has just completed a tenure as dean of students for Michigan Christian College. This summer, she will begin work as assistant to the president of York College. She graduated from York College, Pepperdine University, and California State University at Hayward.

Leonard Knight. Specializing in counseling, Dr. Leonard Knight has served as a youth minister and a children's home counselor. He began working with Michigan Christian College as dean of students in 1978 and now serves as academic dean. Dr. Knight holds degrees from Pepperdine University, Fuller Theological Seminary, and Oakland University.

James LeFan. Beginning his preaching career in 1944, James LeFan preached for the Western Hills Church of Christ in Temple, Texas, for thirty-nine years before his retirement in 1989. He still holds meetings regularly and serves part-time as the visitation minister of the Western Hills congregation. He is a graduate of Abilene Christian University.

Carroll Osburn. Former professor of Greek at Harding University and chairman of the Religion Department of Pepperdine University, Dr. Carroll Osburn is now a graduate professor of Bible at Abilene Christian University. He was recognized as Christian Educator of the Year by 20th Century Christian in 1983. Dr. Osburn holds degrees from Harding University, Harding Graduate School of Religion, Vanderbilt University, and the University of St. Andrews in Scotland.

Neale Pryor. Beginning his teaching career with Harding University in 1962, Dr. Neale Pryor is now a professor of Bible and vice president for academic affairs at Harding. He preaches about fifteen meetings per year in addition to speaking at youth rallies, workshops, and lectureships. Dr. Pryor attended Freed-Hardeman University, Harding University, Harding Graduate School of Religion, and New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary.

Milton Sewell. Eight years of service as director and then vice president of institutional advancement and planning for Freed-Hardeman University prepared Dr. Milton Sewell to serve as president of Mars Hill Bible School from 1983-90. He then returned to Freed-Hardeman to become their president. Dr. Sewell holds degrees from Freed-Hardeman University, Harding University, Florence State College, and the University of Alabama.

Mel Storm. Nine years of experience in preaching and teaching were gained by Dr. Mel Storm while completing his college work. He began teaching at Michigan Christian College in 1986 and now serves as chairman of the Bible Department. He also preaches for the Birmingham Church of Christ. Dr. Storm completed degrees at Pepperdine University and Baylor University.
