## MCC experiences large increase in enrollment

New faces filled the campus of Michigan Christian College as students and new employees arrived for the opening of the thirty-fourth academic year. The largest number of students since the fall of 1985 enrolled, representing an impressive 24% increase in enrollment over the previous academic year.

A combination of gains in the number of both new and returning students contributed to the growth pattern. Admissions personnel, directed by Kent Hoggatt, continued intensive work with new students until the year began. A large increase in the number of juniors remaining at MCC for new academic programs also had a significant impact on the enrollment.

During the past year, college personnel initiated a number of programs that helped boost the enrollment. In the fall, an expanded admissions staff introduced a number of new scholarship programs designed for new students. The faculty and Academic Services Office developed hundreds of "2+2" degree programs to facilitate transfer to other colleges.

In the spring, the college announced the addition of new majors in criminal justice, missions and evangelism, and youth and family ministry. Throughout the year, Dr. Ken Johnson gave regular progress reports on plans for additional four-year majors and campus renovation projects. An air of expectation for the new year prevailed.

As the current student body enrolled, students came to Michigan Christian College from Arkansas, Florida, Georgia, Hawaii, Illinois, Indiana, Kansas, Massachusetts, Michigan, Minnesota, New Hampshire, New York, Ohio, Tennessee, Washington, and Wisconsin. In addition, international students traveled to MCC from Canada, Iran, Japan, the Virgin Islands, and Zimbabwe.

As the college prepares to expand four-year degree offerings, a number of individuals joined the faculty this fall, including Rodney Ashlock, instructor of Bible; David Brackney, instructor of physical science; Pete Brazle, adjunct instructor of Bible and missions; Tina Britton, instructor of biology; Rob Byrd,

instructor of mathematics and computer science; Teresa Fields, adjunct instructor of music; Dr. Wayne Francisco, adjunct professor of criminal justice; Kay Magner, adjunct instructor of music; and Ben Noah, instructor of psychology.

In addition to the changes in

admissions personnel described on page seven, fall transitions among the staff included Mary Alberts, bookstore clerk; Beth Cranford, administrative assistant to the academic dean; Andrea Flatt, assistant director of the Child Development Center; and Susan Noah, accountant.

# Computer lab updated to support new degrees

Updating the former computer lab with new equipment, Michigan Christian College opened a state-of-the-art computer lab this fall to support current and anticipated changes in the academic program.

During the past academic year, the faculty decided to implement a computer literacy requirement in all degree programs. In addition, a committee lead by Dr. Steve Williams, chairman of the business department, developed a proposal for updating the computer lab.

As summer progressed, Dr. Williams coordinated transformation of the computer lab. New IBM compatible 386-33 computers and laser printers eventually replaced the Wang VS computer system and the CPT word processors that had serviced students since 1983.

Academic personnel planned changes in the lab to support not only a computer literacy require-

ment and current course offerings, but also future academic needs. Currently, the college offers a number of computer and word processing courses, as well as four associate degree majors in those areas.

In the immediate future, the new computer equipment will allow all business courses in the proposed Bachelor of Business Administration degree to include a computer component. After receiving permission to offer the B.B.A., the college eventually will be able to consider the addition of a major in management information systems.

Within the next few years, the configuration of the computer lab will permit networking into a second lab and into the college residence halls. While installing new phone lines in the dorms this past summer, workers also placed the hard wire that will be needed to attach dorm terminals into the lab system.

#### Dear Friends:

We are excited! Enrollment is up 24%, from 257 last year to 319 this year. The Lord has greatly blessed our admissions effort over the last twelve months, and we have in place now a full complement of admissions personnel who are already hard at work communicating with another outstanding group of high school students.



Increased enrollment and redecorated facilities come only as a result of increased expenditures—expenditures that we have hereto deferred because we do not have the dollars. For the last three years, reduced enrollments and declining gift revenues have left Michigan Christian College operating in the "red." This year, to avoid another round of red ink, the Board had to make a difficult choice—either shrink the operation and defer critical repairs, or expand with carefully managed growth in enrollment and gifts.

I'm grateful for the foresight of the Board to choose the latter. The first obvious result is a fall enrollment that exceeded our goal. Half of the plan-the enrollment half--is in place and functioning well. We are now focusing our efforts on the other half of the plan-building MCC's donor base. To operate in the black in the current year, we must increase gift income to \$850,000 from \$700,000. This is a far more formidable task than building enrollment, especially since no new large donors are waiting in the wings. Thankfully, MCC has thousands of friends who share in this mission. Some are able to send only relatively small amounts each year; every one of those gifts, regardless of size, is deeply needed and gratefully appreciated. Others, encouraged by the potential from MCC's focus on carefully managed growth, are responding with larger gifts to help ensure the success of our work. We depend on you.

President's Circle is the name given to a group of friends who contribute to MCC \$1,000 or more during a calendar year. Even with other good works in our personal budgets, many of us who believe in MCC do have the potential to be President's Circle contributors. Won't you please make this year the year that you become a member of the President's Circle.

You have made our first year at Michigan Christian College a delightful experience. Your kind words, your continued encouragement, and your generous financial support are vital to this work. We continuously thank God for His role in everything that happens, and dedicate to Him and His eternal kingdom the fruit of our efforts.

#### Queen contest nears festival record

Nearing the 1989 record of \$40,606, queen candidates for the Fall Festival and their supporters raised \$39,447 in queen's votes prior to the September 12 festival. Three candidates, rather than the normal five, reached this impressive figure.

Throughout the summer, local chapters had sponsored dozens of projects on behalf of the queen candidates. Each dollar represented a vote for a particular candidate. Groups catered meals, sold crafts, and served countless portions of food.

Queen candidates included Anna Holder of the Lincoln Park chapter, Iola Rummel of the Echo Meadows chapter, and Jane Vaught of the Ypsilanti chapter. Festival Co-chairman Benita Ward introduced Anna Holder as the 1992 queen during a noon ceremony at the festival.

Participants operated a total of fifty-five booths on festival day. Chapters receiving first place ribbons for decoration of booths included Metro in the food tent, Northern Michigan in the crafts tent, Chase Road in the children's area, and Hazel Park and Pontiac in the outside area.

pictures. Joan Long, festival cochairman, announced that Matthew Pate of Ypsilanti took first place; Keilah Blasingame of Pontiac, second; and Molly Thomas of Sterling Heights third.

While hundreds participated in the Fall Festival activities on campus, other volunteers staffed the mobile kitchen at the annual Art 'n Apples Festival in Rochester. During this event, the Associates raised approximately \$3,000, half of which was applied to Fall Festival proceeds.

Combining income from the queen contest with that of the actual festival day, the Associates have collected over \$53,500 as a result of the annual event.

#### Equipment donated by foundation

Allowing Michigan Christian College to upgrade its administrative computer system, the Kellogg Foundation of Battle Creek, Michigan, recently donated a substantial amount of computer equipment to the college. The donation included twenty-two workstations, five laser printers, and one band printer, all compatible with the college's computer system.

Dr. Ed Blews, president of the Association of Independent Colleges and Universities of Michigan, notified member institutions about the availability of the computer equipment last spring. He stated that the foundation pre-

ferred to donate the equipment to a Michigan private college. Upon learning about the availability of the equipment, Mark Briggs, business services manager of Michigan Christian College, immediately contacted the foundation, and made arrangements to receive the gift.

Aside from the value of the actual equipment, the donation

will save the college approximately \$4,000 per year on maintenance agreements. In addition, the update has increased productivity in several offices. Those offices that previously had to route printing to other locations, may now print documents more efficiently in their own area. Longer reports can now be produced in half the amount of time.

#### **Planned Giving Matters**

The last quarter of the year traditionally has been a popular time to complete charitable gifts that donors have contemplated earlier in the year.

All of us contemplate more gifts than we ultimately consummate. Life has a way of managing our schedule so tightly that we never get around to some of life's more important and more enjoyable experiences.

With far fewer dollars than most colleges have available, we continue to produce young men and women of quality who will make a difference in the world and in the Kingdom of God. Michigan Christian College is a worthy investment which will continue to pay strong dividends in the lives of our youth for many years to come.



# College receives federal grant to develop plan

Michigan Christian College received notification in July that the U.S. Department of Education plans to fund the college's latest Title III grant request for \$17,680. The proposal, originally prepared by Dr. Leonard Knight, dean of academic services, requested a planning grant that is available under the Strengthening Institutions Program.

Normally, the Department of Education funds only about eight-percent of the proposals they receive for planning grants. The proposal submitted by Michigan Christian College received a score of 98 out of 100, resulting in funding.

Funds from the Title III grant will be used to research and prepare a comprehensive development program for the college, and to write another proposal for Title III funding that would help the college implement that program.

Dr. Steve Williams, associate professor of business, has been named Title III project director. He will be assisted by a self-study committee that has been assigned with a similar task of

preparing a comprehensive student assessment plan for the North Central Association. In addition, Walt Gilfilen, former president of Michigan Christian College and a specialist in federal grant programs, has agreed to serve as project consultant, as he did in the writing of the original proposal for the planning grant.

During the next year, Dr. Williams will complete a number of specific tasks as the Title III project director. He will organize a series of workshops for board members, employees, and representatives from support groups, to discuss institutional goals and planning. He will review and summarize all institutional research data from the past ten years.

In addition to his efforts with workshops and institutional research, Dr. Williams will prepare an analysis of demographic trends in southeast Michigan, and conduct a market survey of the area. The resulting data will provide valuable information that can be used in developing new academic programs, and in

strengthening placement services for the graduates of Michigan Christian College.

Efforts funded by the Title III planning grant will culminate in January of 1994, when the college will submit its next Title III

grant proposal. As intended by the Title III Strengthening Institutions Program, Michigan Christian College should be better equipped to serve students into the twenty-first century as a result of this planning process.

#### Local church features former ministry interns

Academic preparation continues in the summer for a number of Michigan Christian College students as they complete internship requirements for the Bachelor of Religious Education degree. Students majoring in Christian ministry, counseling, missions and evangelism, and youth and family ministry must each work in a supervised setting related to their major before receiving their degree from Michigan Christian College.

The Parkside Church of Christ in Dearborn Heights, Michigan, has worked with interns from Michigan Christian College for a number of years. On November 1, the congregation plans to honor each of their former interns at a Minister-in-Training Sunday. During the day, each of the former interns will be speaking for the congregation.

Parkside's first intern, Randy Dill, currently preaches for the Evanston Avenue Church of Christ in Muskegon, Michigan. Dan Corp serves as minister for the Church of Christ in Milan, Michigan. Jim Calkin is employed as an admissions counselor for Michigan Christian College, and until recently worked on a part-time basis with the Lake Orion Church of Christ.

Parkside's last intern, Mark Brackney, currently is working part-time with the Church of Christ in Lexington, Oklahoma, while completing his master's degree at Oklahoma Christian. Parkside's current intern, Tony Reynolds, will complete his degree at Michigan Christian College in the spring. Parkside plans to employ Tony on a full-time basis after he graduates.

Russ Bone, minister of the Parkside congregation, commented, "Each young man communicates their appreciation to the Parkside congregation as well as the elders for this program." The internship program has provided valuable experience for each student, and a good resource for neighboring congregations.

#### At a Glance

Initial enrollment in the criminal justice program exceeded expectations as the college initiated the new major this fall. The first two courses offered in the program, Introduction to Criminal Justice and Police Processes and Operations, each attracted almost double the number of students expected.

# Christian camps benefit from 20 years of service

Such comments from Christian camp directors arrived on campus regularly over the past summer as twelve students and two employees from Michigan Christian College spent a portion of their summer working as counselors in sixteen camps.

Camp workers from MCC spent the majority of their time at camps fulfilling the normal responsibilities of cabin counselors or activity directors. In addition, they served as representatives of the college, obtaining the names of teens and encouraging students to consider Michigan Christian College.

Over the past summer, MCC representatives assisted in a combined total of sixty camp sessions at Michigan Christian Youth Camp and Beechwood Hills in Michigan; Fort Hill, Northeastern, Northwestern, and Judson in Ohio; Indogan, Wabashi, and Spring Mill in Indiana; Illinois Christian and Rockford in Illinois; Wisconsin Christian and Lake Geneva in Wisconsin; Camp Concern in Pennsylvania; Agape in New York; and Omagh in Ontario.

For twenty years, camps in

most of the North Central states have benefited from the service of counselors that have been provided by Michigan Christian College. With the exception of one year, the college has sent representatives to camps since the summer of 1972.

Nearly 200 students have represented MCC in twenty-three camps over the years. Even though some of the camps no longer exist, MCC counselors have touched the lives of children and teens in over 900 weeks of Christian camping.

MCC representatives have provided a valuable staffing resource for the camps. As stated by one director, "I appreciate MCC for allowing a student to come each summer."

#### Renovations peak during summer

Renovation projects on the campus of Michigan Christian College increased during the summer months, giving many facilities a new look prior to the opening of the academic year. Throughout the summer, maintenance personnel, student workers, volunteers, and contractors accomplished numerous projects.

Over a four-month period, workers applied over 370 gallons of paint, redecorated a number of areas, removed the trailer previously used by the Development Office, and completely renovated two facilities. Contractors supplemented those efforts by replacing three roofs, installing a new campus-wide phone system, and com-

pleting a variety of other specialized tasks.

Even though some areas received more attention than others, every permanent facility experienced change. As stated by David Parks, a local minister who is pursuing his counseling degree at MCC, "I have never seen so much improvement in college facilities in just one year."

Gallaher Center. Volunteers from the Alumni Association completely renovated the music facilities in the lower level of Gallaher Center. Workers covered walls with an attractive vinyl-covered wallboard, built curved, permanent risers for the chorus, installed new lighting, and recarpeted the entire area. Contractors replaced the roof surface on the flat areas of the building, installed a new heating system in the west end, and leveled the sidewalks leading to the front entrance.

Muirhead Library. Enhancing several improvements that took place in the library last January, maintenance personnel completely renovated the entrance and circulation center of the Muirhead Library. In addition, a contractor replaced the roof on the entire building.

Associates Campus Center. Workers painted a number of rooms in the residence hall portion of the Associates Campus Center before redecorating the hallway of the west wing. Dean Candace Cain prepared murals in the hallway to coordinate with the lobby mural. Maintenance personnel built additional cabinets for the beverage area of the cafeteria, added ceramic tile to the food service line, and updated the appearance of the hallway leading into the cafeteria. Contractors replaced the roof on the west wing, recarpeted a classroom and a portion of the dorm rooms, and leveled the sidewalks in front of the building.

Westside Central Chapel and Utley Student Center. Maintenance personnel added windows to the hallway doors near the Westside Central Chapel and those entering the Utley Student Center. A contractor repaired settling cracks in both facilities.

Gatewood Residence Hall. After painting and recarpeting a number of rooms, workers gave the lobby of the Alma Gatewood Residence Hall a fresh appearance by refinishing the walls.

Barbier Residence Hall. In addition to painting and recarpeting several rooms, maintenance personnel repaired and repainted the outside surface of Barbier Residence Hall. Dean Cain coordinated the painting of murals on the outside of the building, along with the addition of a canopy over the entrance.

Palmer Residence Hall. Maintenance personnel installed kitchen cabinets from the former Homemaking House in three suites of Palmer Residence Hall to accommodate married student housing. After workers painted and recarpeted some of the rooms, Dean Cain added wallpaper and borders to the married student units.

Gymnasium. Using funds donated by individuals in the Rochester Hills community, workers painted both the exterior and a portion of the interior of the gym. They replaced the backboards on the side walls and added mats behind all of the backboards. Dean Cain painted a mural on one wall, and Coach Garth Pleasant obtained banners honoring

the college's championship teams and All-American athletes.

Science Center. Workers repainted the entire interior of the Science Center and resurfaced many of the ceilings in the building. In addition, they replaced a portion of the roof over the Biology laboratory.

Gatehouse. Maintenance personnel completely renovated the interior of the Gatehouse into two attractive classrooms.

Upon entering the presidency of Michigan Christian College, Dr. Ken Johnson unveiled plans to refurbish the entire campus within a two-year period. A great deal has been accomplished toward that goal in the first year.
