#### Campus takes on new appearance as construction progresses

Dramatic, exciting, and phenomenal are just a few of the words chosen by observers to describe the transformation taking place on the campus of Michigan Christian College. "Every weekend, I walk around the construction site and am amazed at the extent of the change that is taking place," stated Bob Utley, chairman of the board.

This past spring, contractors began work on a \$4.2 million dollar construction project for Michigan Christian College, including two residence halls, a campus commons, a new campus entryway, and major improvements in roads and parking areas. "Although the crews experienced a late start because of unusually heavy spring rains, they are now making substantial progress toward their goal of a spring completion date," stated Mark Davis, vice president for operations.

"We expected this project to make a big impact on the image of the campus," stated Dr. Ken Johnson, president of the college. "Most people, however, are surprised at the magnitude of the change. Even the local residents of Rochester Hills have been commenting on the impressive scale of the project."

Currently, contractors have completed most of the site work,

including drain systems, utility hookups, curbing, sidewalks, and parking areas. "Within the next couple of weeks, we will be able to complete paving and begin using the new entrance road and parking areas," stated Mr. Davis. "At that time we also will be able to remove the old entrance leading to the Alma Gatewood Residence Hall and reshape the parking area near the Westside-Central Auditorium."

Masons completed exterior walls of the building by mid-October, allowing for construction of the roof superstructure, and began laying exterior brick by the end of the month. "The construction firm plans to have the building enclosed within the next few weeks so workers can complete the interior during the winter," stated Mr. Davis.

"In addition to the actual construction, we have experienced a lot of great side benefits from this project," noted Mr. Davis. "Rather than pay to haul extra dirt from the campus, we formed berms along Avon Road and created a riverside park in back of Barbier Residence Hall and the actual construction site. Also, millions of gallons of runoff water will now be diverted to the campus lakes from the new roadway and parking areas."

"Like any project of this scale,

everyone has found it necessary to deal with inconvenience," commented Dr. Johnson. "When construction engulfed the parking lot by the Alma Gatewood Residence Hall, many had to start parking on lawns until completion of the new lots. Housekeeping personnel are challenged daily with the tracking of dirt and mud into buildings near the construction site. Yet, everyone

is taking it all in stride because of the tremendous benefits they foresee at the end of the project."

"What a difference this construction project is making and is going to make," concluded Dr. Johnson. "We anticipate formal opening of the new complex and the wonderful opportunities for service that this facility will provide as we serve students far into the next century."

# State and NCA approve addition of B.S. degree

Marking another significant milestone in the development of bachelor's degree programs, Michigan Christian College recently received authorization to offer the Bachelor of Science degree. "Based upon the positive response we received during our recent site visit, both the state of Michigan and the North Central Association granted approval without further visits," stated Dr. Mike Westerfield, vice president for academic affairs.

"At this point in time, addition of the Bachelor of Science degree has allowed us to reposition the human services major under a more appropriate degree title," noted Dr. Westerfield. "As we decide to add other majors in future years, one major step in the process has been removed since the state granted B.S. approval with no limitations."

The college added a counsel-

ing major under the Bachelor of Religious Education degree in 1989. As that program developed an outstanding reputation, the faculty developed additional majors. Under current structuring, specializations in counseling, criminal justice, early childhood education, psychology, and social work are offered under the human services major of the Bachelor of Science degree.

"Students from Michigan have benefited from this change in a very significant way," stated Wendy Denny, director of financial aid. "Previously, students enrolled in the human services program under the Bachelor of Religious Education degree program could not receive the Michigan Tuition Grant. Many of our human services majors now receive the full \$2,300 tuition grant from the state as part of their financial aid package."

#### Students return to exciting changes

Students returned to the campus of Michigan Christian College for the fall semester amid exciting changes. In addition to an obvious campus transformation from construction, the students soon discovered a broader array of academic programs and began meeting a number of new college employees.

"This summer, the admissions staff prayed for students who would understand and benefit from the mission of the college,' stated Vikki Bentley, assistant to the vice president for academic affairs. "Those prayers were answered with a student body that is enthusiastic about being a part of the wonderful things that are taking place on campus.

Along with a 16% growth rate in the number of new students, enrollment in the new education program exceeded expectations. Others benefited from a restructuring of the human services major under the Bachelor of Sci-

#### Technical degree options initiated

Michigan Christian College recently announced agreements with Oakland Community College and Macomb Community College to offer cooperative degree programs. Through an innovative approach, students will be able to complete a specialization in a technical field at the community college and earn a bachelor's degree from Michigan Christian College.

"Eventually, these agreements will allow Michigan Christian College to serve three new markets of students," stated Dr. Mike

Westerfield, vice president for academic affairs. "Not only will we be able to serve community college graduates, but also those students coming to us as freshmen with an interest in technical fields. We also anticipate the development of a strong adult student program for technical program graduates already in the work force.

With specializations available in numerous technical areas, students will be able to pursue such fields as computer information systems, graphic and commercial art, health care administration, and vehicle design. The program also is adaptable for technical program graduates of other community colleges.

"The vehicle design program alone has tremendous potential," noted Dr. Westerfield. "Macomb has developed a strong program in vehicle design, known for its outstanding placement record in the automobile industry. Since both colleges are located in the automobile capital of the world, the cooperative program will allow the students of Michigan Christian College to tap into an exciting career field in a way that is possible only in this region of the United States."

This fall, the college employed Angela Hazel as the college's first director of adult education. Currently, Mrs. Hazel is finalizing plans for a degree completion program that will be offered in short terms in the evening and on weekends.

"Both Macomb and Oakland are excited about the new doors our cooperative programs will open for their graduates," noted Mrs. Hazel. "Officials from both institutions anticipate substantial interest since our program provides maximum transfer of credit from technical as well as liberal arts courses earned in the community college setting.

#### **Employee Highlights**

Serving as a trainer for consultant evaluators, **Dr. Michael Westerfield**, vice president for academic affairs, participated in the annual meeting of the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools in Chicago last spring. In July, he conducted a training session for new deans at the National Conference of Academic Deans at the University of Memphis.

The Oakland Press honored Coach Garth Pleasant in a feature on the front page of the sports section after he hit his 400th career victory. In an article entitled Shooting Hoops with a Message, the paper stated "Coach Pleasant is as intense on the bench during a crucial game as he is off the court trying to shape young college students into responsible men and women ready to make a contribution."

Based upon the recommendation of a former student, **Joe Bentley**, associate professor of music, has been named to the 1996 edition of *Who's Who Among America's Teachers*. Only 5% of the nation's teachers are recognized by the publication.

Participating in the 100th anniversary Boston Marathon, **Michael Light**, cross country and track coach, completed the 26.2 mile run with over 28,000 individuals from around the world. Coach Light passed over 10,000 runners by beginning in position 20,366 and finishing in position 9,813.

Rochester featured **Dr. John Todd**, associate professor of business law, as speaker for their annual Memorial Day parade. Dr. Todd is the recipient of numerous military decorations, including the Distinguished Flying Cross for Valor.

**Dr. David Fleer**, associate professor of religion and communication, preached for the North Warren Church of Christ on an interim basis during the summer. Last spring, he served as a panelist on the Pepperdine University Lectureship.

Speaking from the book of I Peter, **Dr. Mel Storm**, associate professor of religion, taught two classes at the Harding University Lectureship in September. He discussed the topic *Chosen for Life: Becoming God's Own People*.

Steve Jones, assistant professor of business, recently agreed to serve on an Academy of Management committee that is assigned with the task of formulating AACSB accreditation standards for entrepreneur programs. Last spring, Mr. Jones made a presentation on the impact of federal regulations on small businesses at the Southwestern Small Business Institute Association Conference in San Antonio, Texas.

Soon after receiving career counselor certification from the National Board for Certified Counselors, **Dr. Ben Noah**, assistant professor of human services, received his Ph.D. in human services from Walden University.

#### **Worth Repeating**

Following the Michigan Collegiate Job Fair, the director of training and recruiting for Mutual of Omaha wrote to Dr. Ben Noah, director of career guidance, stating "I spoke with a few of your students at the fair and will be interviewing a couple of them very soon. We were very impressed with the quality and maturity of the students."

Focus, a performing group from the college, visited Pennsylvania Christian Camp this past summer. After their visit, the Admissions Office received a letter from the director, praising one of the members of Focus for providing a listening ear and guidance for one of their campers. He stated, "You sent us more than a singing/drama group. You gave us men and women who obviously have hearts for God and who are willing to serve."

Describing a conversation at a meeting of motel managers, one recently wrote to the college about the reaction of a colleague to a team that stayed at her motel. "For a good ten minutes, she enthused about the team's good behavior and nice manners. Finally, when I could get a word in edgewise, I asked 'Is this the team from Michigan Christian College?' and she said, 'Yes! That's the one!' I personally was not surprised."

#### Doubleday releases professor's book

Doubleday, one of the nation's leading publishers, recently released *Good Kids*, a new book by nationally-recognized author, lecturer, and researcher, Dr. Michael A. O'Donnell. Just prior to the release of his new book, Dr. O'Donnell accepted a position as professor of family studies and chairman of the human services department at Michigan Christian College.

"I was first moved in the direction of Michigan Christian College by the vision of Dr. Ken Johnson," stated Dr. O'Donnell. "Dr. Johnson inspires confidence and revived in me a sense of mission for serving the church in the northern corridor of the United States."

Originally from Pennsylvania, Dr. O'Donnell has served as a vice president for Northeastern Christian College, a dean for Faulkner University, and as an associate professor and director of the Center for Fathering at Abilene Christian University. Last year, he lived in Philadelphia while completing research and writing projects.

In addition to addressing over sixty state and national conferences over the last five years, Dr. O'Donnell spoke to the United Nations in Vienna in 1995. His work has been featured in over 100 television and radio interviews and over 100 magazine and newspaper features.

Dr. O'Donnell's latest book, Good Kids: How You and Your Kids Can Successfully Navigate the Teen Years, is designed to introduce readers to vital keys for teen success. Based upon ground-breaking research by Dr. O'Donnell and coauthor Dr. Nick Stinnett of the University of Alabama, each chapter of the book contains real-life stories of teen-

#### Home School Science camp expands

"Thank you so much for the wonderful week of learning and fun at science camp," stated Julie Robbins, a participant in the college's first Home School Science Camp. "I hope and pray God will continue to bless you so this science camp will continue."

According to David Brackney, instructor of physical science and director of the program, Julie can look forward to another year of camp. "Since we filled the program last summer, we plan to expand into a second week," stated Mr. Brackney. "Tenta-

tively, we plan to offer two sessions in July, one for grades 8-10 and another for grades 10-12."

College officials planned the camp to meet a growing need among families choosing home schooling for their children. Most are not able to provide laboratory experiences, so the Science Camp provided a five-day program with laboratory projects in biology, earth science, chemistry, and physical science.

#### Women's teams enter second decade

Women's athletics at Michigan Christian College entered a second decade of competition at the opening of the fall semester. The college originally expanded the intercollegiate program to include a wider array of women's sports in the fall of 1986.

"Over the past ten years, our competition level and player quality have improved dramatically," stated Barry Wheeler, volleyball and basketball coach.

"We are excited to see how the program continues to develop over the next decade."

"When our women's program began, we primarily played smaller colleges," noted Coach Wheeler. "Now, we play NAIA and NCAA colleges and universities for many of our games."

Even though the teams compete on a higher level, they have done so effectively. "Last year, we not only came within one or

two points of defeating several NAIA institutions; we actually won basketball games with the bigger colleges," stated Coach Wheeler. "We even came within three points of playing for the national volleyball championship in the NSCAA."

Contributing to their success with larger institutions, the amount of available talent has increased in recent years. "When we started our program, we often took bench players to fill the team," noted Coach Wheeler. "Now the players are seeking us out and most are coming in with league or state honors from class A high schools."

"During the next decade, we look forward to construction of a new athletic center," stated Coach Wheeler. "It is difficult to run a national tournament at an off-campus site as we have done over the past two years. It is hard to find locations for games and attendance fluctuates because of the inconvenience."

"Already, we have some of the best fans. Those attending the games really support us," remarked Coach Wheeler. "A new center can only enhance our program and its success."

"I enjoy the days that we use the entire period for worship," stated Wendy Robertson, a senior childcare management student from Flushing, Michigan. "The whole program is definitely more uplifting this year because the students are more excited about being there."

Tony Shaver, a senior social work student from Cambridge, Ohio commented, "I like the variety this year. Breaking the days designated entirely for worship with a special day for speakers and another for small groups makes the worship days less repetitious. The worship days are now special and I now look forward to them even more."

"Students are more involved

Good instructors are the heart of a quality academic program. Joining the faculty of Michigan Christian College this fall, **Deborah Haskell**, assistant professor of English, brings substantial teaching experience from three other institutions of similar heritage, Northeastern Christian Junior College, Ohio Valley College, and International Christian University of Vienna, Austria. She holds an associate degree from Northeastern Christian Junior College, a bachelor's degree from Abilene Christian University, and a master's degree from Columbia Pacific University.

Experiences in guidance counseling for public schools and residential services for a children's home enrich the classroom settings of **Joyce Duvall**, assistant professor of psychology. After completing a degree at Michigan Christian College in 1963, she earned a bachelor's degree from Abilene Christian University and a master's degree from Kutztown State University. Based on documentation she prepared prior to joining the faculty of Michigan Christian College this fall, her previous institution received exemplary status as one of the twelve outstanding vocational programs in the nation.

#### Key college leader honored by new scholarship

Honoring a key leader in the history of Michigan Christian College, friends and family of Royce Dickinson recently established an endowed scholarship in his memory. "Few individuals characterize the sacrifice required to build a college better than Royce Dickinson," stated Dr. Ken Johnson, president of the college. "In his work as a volunteer, as an employee, and as a board member, Royce symbolizes the spirit of Michigan Christian College."

With a diverse background in business, preaching, and the F.B.I., Mr. Dickinson began teaching part-time at Michigan Christian College on a volunteer basis in the fall of 1972. "Immediately, Dr. Gardner, president of the college, recognized the level of skill and talent that Royce possessed," stated Larry Stewart, director of admissions at that time. "Before long, Dr. Gardner persuaded Royce to begin work as vice president."

As vice president of the college, Mr. Dickinson supervised the business office and maintenance department, and chaired the student life committee. "Rovce came to the college at a

very challenging time in the institution's history," stated Dr. Larry Jurney, former dean. "If he had not guided carefully the college's funds to maintain buildings, pay debts, and track pledges, the college likely would not have survived."

"For some time, Royce continued to preach for the Gateway Church of Christ, so he commuted to the campus," stated his wife Betty. "He would spend the week on campus, using a room in one of the residence halls." For months, Mr. Dickinson served without pay to help improve the college's financial status.

"Royce and I worked on the discipline committee together," stated Don Robinson, former director of student life. "Royce was a strict disciplinarian, but he was also a gentle, loving, and forgiving man. As a young college administrator, I learned a great deal from this Godly man."

Mrs. Dickinson cited maintenance as one of her husband's greatest challenges. "He developed ulcers over this part of his job," she stated. Mr. Robinson recalled, "One year, the night before the students were to move into the dorms, Royce worked with the staff until after midnight installing new carpet."

Debi Hoggatt, who knew Mr. Dickinson as a student and as an admissions counselor recalled, "I always think of going in his office to ask something and facing the sign on his desk, 'Blessed are they that expect nothing, for they shall not be disappointed.' His dry sense of humor made interactions enjoyable, even when he said 'no'. He had a solid air of confidence that brought calm to

any situation. He always knew exactly what to do."

After leaving employment with the college in 1978, Mr. Dickinson began a successful tenure on the Board of Trustees. He served as vice chairman from 1980 to 1986, and as chairman from 1986 until a year before his death in 1994. His wife, Betty, and three children, Royce Dickinson, Jr., Edward Dickinson, and Kathy Duesel are all graduates of Michigan Christian College.

#### Dedication

Two special men guided Michigan Christian College through pivotal years in the 1970's. Their unique blend of creative leadership and sound management skills helped position the college for further growth. This issue of the North Star is lovingly dedicated to Dr. Don Gardner and Royce Dickinson.

#### Former president leaves rich legacy

Christian education lost one of its greatest champions on September 11, 1996. On that day, Dr. Don Gardner, third president of Michigan Christian College, died at age 69, following a heart attack.

During his remarkable life, Dr. Gardner served as the president of four Christian colleges, and as an administrator for two others. At the time of his death, he and his wife, Audrey, were leading the National Christian School Association, an organization of 109 schools and academies affiliated with the churches of Christ.

"At least three colleges attribute their current existence to Dr. Gardner," stated Larry Stewart, who worked with Dr. Gardner for six years. "He not only had a profound influence on those institutions, but on the lives of those who knew him. To this day, I find myself dealing with situations in ways that Dr. Gardner taught by example."

"Dr. Gardner could inspire us to do our best," stated Dr. Larry Jurney, former dean. "We would come away from weekly meetings with new projects, new tasks, and new ideas. Often we felt like we were doing multiple jobs, but we were happy to do so. We felt we were a part of building something great."

During Dr. Gardner's presidency at Michigan Christian College from 1971 to 1978, gift income tripled and enrollment doubled. At the same time, the college achieved accreditation and reduced its debt by almost 50%. He originated the Partnership Dinner and Phone-a-Visit, and conceptualized Celebration in Song and Autumn.

"The thing I loved most about Dr. Gardner was his vision," stated Randy Gill, an original member of Autumn and former choral director. "He had an uncanny ability to see things nobody else saw. Whether it was spotting potential in a young and untested teacher or being able to visualize greatness in a college others had written off, Dr. Gardner could find the best in anyone and in any place."

"Dr. Gardner knew how to inspire people to achieve so much," stated Don Robinson, former student life director. "He somehow knew what great potential people had and he inspired them to put that potential into motion." Garth Pleasant, who shared the first year with Dr. Gardner, stated, "He always seemed to be a step ahead and gave all his energy to the task at hand."

Kent Hoggatt, an admissions counselor under Dr. Gardner, stated, "He appeared to have an inexhaustible pool of ideas and energy to match! He was successful in enlisting others and involving them in his dreams." Mr. Hoggatt added, "You could not outwork Dr. Gardner!"

"Dr. and Mrs. Gardner were the greatest motivational team I have ever worked with," noted Mr. Robinson. "They inspired hundreds of young people to reach for the heavens. Their vision and their faith in what God could do with me, led me on a journey that I could never have made on my own."

### Program for ministers draws renewed interest

Michigan Christian College recently redesigned its professional ministry program, which quickly began drawing attention upon release of program details. "We sent out about 200 letters to graduates of Sunset International Bible Institute and received about a dozen calls within days," stated Dr. David Fleer, program director.

With thirty-eight hours of course work from another college and a diploma from a school of preaching or Bible college, an individual can earn a bachelor's degree with as few as thirty credits. "Since the program allows individuals to complete much of the work from their hometown, we already have students from such places as Texas, Florida, Ohio, and Israel enrolled in the program," noted Dr. Fleer.

"The program offers four ex-


citing methods of degree completion," Dr. Fleer continued. "Students earn credit through oncampus seminars, a life experience portfolio, critical book reviews, and a senior thesis." Seminars are offered in one-week blocks to minimize the amount of time a minister must spend away from his home.

Mark Frost, minister of the Trenton Church of Christ, taught one of the seminar classes last spring. After the class ended, he commented, "The mix of regular ministerial students with seasoned ministers like Daniel Rouse and Jeffery Smith of the 1,700-member Sunset Church of Christ of Lubbock, Texas, was an incredible learning experience for everyone."



Anyone who listens to the news hears about the problems of the Social Security system and other federal programs that benefit those who are retired. The Social Security trust fund is now predicted by the Social Security Administration to be out of money by the year 2029.

The gift amount will be subject to income tax, but will also qualify as a deductible gift. Basically, no tax is paid on the retirement account funds given by most who itemize their deductions.
- Similarly, if you are over age 70 1/2, the law requires you to make withdrawals from your IRA's. If you find that you do not need the money for living expenses, it can be economically donated as a gift. Such gifts can be determined on an annual basis, so funds are not tied up in case they are needed for medical expenses or other costs.

#### Second book completed by alumnus

Drawing upon his roots in Southeast Michigan for heartwarming stories about home, John W. After graduating from Michigan Christian College, Mr. Smith received his bachelor's degree from the University of Michigan and a master's degree from North Arizona University. He taught in the public school system of Kingman, Arizona, for several years, while serving as a minister and an elder.

In the years that followed, Mr. Smith preached for churches in Texas and Alabama, and taught English at both Lubbock Christian University and Faulkner University



#### Cooperative program in education set

Meeting the needs of regular numbers of students, Michigan Christian College recently finalized arrangements with a local university to offer cooperative academic programs in elementary and secondary education. Under the arrangement, students will complete their first three years of academic work with Michigan Christian College, and the remainder of course work and state certification through Madonna University of Livonia, Michigan.

"This arrangement is very significant for the students of Michigan Christian College," stated Dr. Mike Westerfield, vice president for academic affairs. "For years, hundreds have received associate degrees from Michigan Christian College before going on to complete degrees in education. Now, students can complete three full years of their program on our campus, while continuing to live in our



residence halls and participate in our campus activities for the re-

mainder of their studies." Initial response to the program exceeded expectations. Over thirty students, mostly juniors, enrolled in Introduction to Professional Education Experiences, the first education course taught by Michigan Christian College under the new plan. "The program mushroomed so quickly that Madonna University has gone out of their way to cater to the needs of our students," noted David Brackney, campus director of the program. "They have even hired support staff to coordinate the program."

Under current arrangements, students complete all general education and religion courses at Michigan Christian College, as well as selected education courses. "In most cases all but twelve credit hours in a student's major may be taken from Michigan Christian College, as well as most if not all of their minor for secondary education," noted Mr. Brackney.

"Madonna University has made a commitment to teach a minimum of ten semester hours of the professional education courses on our campus each year," continued Mr. Brackney. "With sufficient demand, which we expect, they will offer almost all of the education sequence on our campus."

"As we began considering institutions that might be interested in forming an arrangement, we realized that we had to find a local college to meet regulations of the state of Michigan and the North Central Association," stated Dr. Westerfield. "Knowing the reputation of Madonna University for a high-quality education program, they quickly surfaced as the ideal choice. We have been extremely pleased with the results."

Over the past three years, Michigan Christian College has aggressively pursued a broader array of academic programs. The college now offers fourteen specializations at the bachelor's degree level in areas of management, human services, and Christian services.

"We decided that the best way for us to offer a quality program in education was to join hands with someone already doing an outstanding job in that field," commented Dr. Ken Johnson, president of the college. "We find that most of our students want to stay in this area for their entire academic career. This program allows them to achieve that goal."
