G. Wheeler Utley (1916-2002)

G. Wheeler Utley, one of the founders of Rochester College and chairman of the Board of Trustees from 1955-1974, died February 6 in Sun City, California, at the age of 85.

About 5,000 people have received a Christian education at Rochester since Utley helped open the College in 1959. Hundreds more join that number every year, a fitting and lasting tribute to a man who gave 20 years of his life to Christian education in the North Central United States.

Students feed homeless

About 25 students fired up a cookout in April for over 150 of Detroit's homeless people. The cookout was one of several projects sponsored during the school year by IMAGE, a student service organization.

IMAGE leader Stephanie Britten (sr., Schoolcraft, Mich.) said IMAGE drew nearly 50 students at most of its projects in Detroit. That represents nearly 15 percent of the College s oncampus population.

On three occasions students packed sack lunches and delivered them to homeless people on Detroit's gritty streets and alleys. Britten said the students shared their testimonies and a prayer with every person they met.

State approves Rochester BA

College also enters joint venture with Specs Howard School of Broadcast Arts

Rochester College recently took the final step of a journey that began almost 50 years ago when Christians from the Detroit and Toledo areas decided to build a liberal arts college in the North Central United States.

On May 29, the State of Michigan authorized the College to confer the Bachelor of Arts degree starting this fall. The BA is the fourth and final Bachelor's degree in the College's degree portfolio. The others are the Bachelor of Religious Education (added in 1980), the Bachelor of Business Administration (added in 1993) and the Bachelor of Science (added in 1996).

"The BA is the key to moving our tradition of quality liberal arts to the next level," said provost Dr. Michael Westerfield. "Our students have a new option for career preparation."

Beginning this fall, the College will confer the BA degree upon communication, English, history and music majors. Up until now the College offered those programs under the BS degree. Westerfield said the College will add a BA in interdisciplinary studies some-

time "in the next year".

With the BA approved, the College will turn its attention to winning approval for the Master's degree in religion.

"We're working on drafting a proposal to submit to the state and our accrediting association," said Westerfield.


Meanwhile, the College signed a joint venture agreement with the Specs Howard School of Broadcast Arts that will power up a new mass communication major at Rochester.

Under the May 23 agreement, Specs Howard will deliver 24-36 hours of credit as part of the mass communication major. Students who choose the new major will receive in-studio, hands-on training in radio or television broadcasting, or both.

The College of Extended Learning also added a new computer systems management (CSM) major to its course selections at the main campus in Rochester and at the Mott Community College University Center campus in Flint, Michigan.

Library due date: Aug. 1

Officials say new library will be on time for fall term



As June ended, workers entered the final stages of construction on the new Ennis and Nancy Ham Library as the College's advancement office passed the \$4 million mark in the 'Catch the Vision' campaign.

"We're going to finish this project and this campaign very strong," said Doug Edwards, vice president for institutional advancement. "We're very grateful to [contractor] Frank Rewold, thousands of donors from all over the country and to God."

Gary Carson, vice president for human resources and special projects said he expects Rewold to turn over the keys to the new building by August 1.

"The library staff should be able to begin moving inventory from Muirhead Library to the new building by August 1," said Carson.

A few weeks ago, Carson began leading College faculty and employees on inside ours of the new building.

"The new library will be much more comfortable, convenient and accessible," said Steven Bowers (95), director of library services. "We'll be able to provide several new services including an automated catalog, personal study areas and work/study rooms for small groups."

Bowers said his staff is very excited about several new features that will make their jobs easier and the new library user-friendly for the students.

"One thing I'm sure the students will be excited about is the new student lounge," said Bowers. "Students will love the lounge."

The student lounge will be a community area where students will be able to get comfy while snacking, socializing and studying. Other new features include three new classrooms and a 30-terminal computer lab, wider aisles between bookshelves (Muirhead's aisles are so narrow two people can't walk down them at once) and a microfiche system that will enable librarians to locate and e-mail text to students' electronic mailboxes.

College honors Louie Welch

Rochester College conferred an honorary doctorate on longtime Houston, Texas, mayor and friend of Christian education Louie Welch at graduation on May 11.

Welch served five terms as Houston's mayor from 1964-1974, presided over the United States Conference of Mayors in 1972 and 1973 and is a member of the College's National Advancement Board.

"Louie Welch's life of public service and friendship with Rochester College and all of Christian education make this an appropriate gesture," said Provost Michael Westerfield.

Students in Kenya

Seven students left for Nairobi, Kenya, on July 4 to volunteer for four weeks at day camps for homeless children. The project is under the leadership of World Wide Youth Camps, a Texas-based Christian organization that seeks to aid the world's most impoverished children, and Made In The Streets School, a Christian Kenyan school that helps homeless children get off the streets and learn trades for a productive lifestyle.

The students and locals will work side by side to teach Bible classes and interact with the children.


Qazwini came at the invitation of English professor Jennifer Hamilton whose world literature class was studying the literary elements of the Qur'an.

We graduated the largest baccalaureate class in the College's history, said provost Dr. Michael Westerfield. Unity of all believers

Sermon Seminar lives up to Restoration plea

In the spirit of the Restoration Movement's plea for the unity of all believers, 140 ministers from 14 Christian fellowships and 27 states assembled on May 20-22 at the College's fifth annual Sermon Seminar.

Organizers designed the seminar to give ministers access to the finest biblical scholars and preaching experts. The lecturers and participants engaged in two days of work and reflection on the task of preaching. This year's seminar attracted the largest and most diverse crowd to ever attend the event.

"The overwhelming response from Church of Christ preachers was that nothing like this exists in the Churches of Christ," said Dr. David Fleer, the event's principal organizer. Several participants agreed with Fleer, saying that the seminar was a "historic occassion."

"This seminar brought together people from a variety of faith backgrounds for a unity of purpose to improve preaching through a biblical perspective," said Dr. Michael Westerfield, Rochester College provost. "I believe that this is a critical part of our mission."

"The high point of the seminar was [Dr. Luke] Johnson's cutting edge scholarship," said Fleer. "This was fresh material from a world class scholar. The

seminar and the book to follow represent the best thinking in the disciplines of homiletics and biblical studies."

Dr. Johnson is the Woodruff Professor of New Testament and Christian Origins at the Chandler School of Theology, Emory University, Atlanta, Georgia. The lectures he and others presented at the seminar will be printed in a book published by ACU Press.

Dr. Richard Eslinger of United Theological Seminary, Dr. Randy Harris of Abilene Christian University, Dr. Greg Stevenson of Rochester College and Ross Thomson of Northlake Church of Christ (Atlanta) also lectured on topics from the book of Hebrews.

Organizers said the seminar experience emphasized the participants' unity of purpose in preaching the gospel of Jesus Christ.

"God came," said Fleer. "Sometimes a person plans an activity... and forgets to invite God. God came to this event. God was visible in the world imagined by Hebrews and in the Christian spirit of love and inquiry."

The next Sermon Seminar will take place June 9-11, 2003, and will focus on preaching from the eighth century prophets. Dr. William Willimon, dean of the chapel at Duke University, will be the lead presenter.

Associates announce newfundraiser

After 41 years the Associates of Rochester College will retire Fall Festival and replace the traditional autumn fundraiser with a new event called the Queen's Dinner and an alumni play.

"We are no longer able to hold Fall Festival on campus since we built the new library on the festival site," said Associates president Julie Harper (79). "We decided to try something new and different that would involve a lot more alumni."

Alma Gatewood, the wife of Otis Gatewood, the College's first president, led the establishment of the Associates in 1959 when about 300 women set out to raise money for the new college. The Associates raised over \$4 million over the next four decades.

The Associates introduced Fall Festival in 1960 and just a few years later students and Rochester residents came to expect the one-day country-style fair to come around every autumn.

The 1990's brought competition from other fairs and a campus expansion that led to construction of the new Ennis and Nancy Ham Library on the College's front lawn. Suddenly, Fall Festival had no place left to pitch its tents.

The Associates responded quickly and created a new event that they think will be as profitable and eventually as traditional as Fall Festival.

The new Queen's Dininer will treat friends of the College to a catered dinner, entertainment and at least one surviving Fall Festival tradition: the crowning of the Associates Queen.

The Associates will host the inaugural Queen's Dinner in the Fletcher Center at 5:30 p.m. on August 10, followed by an alumni play at the Westside-Central Auditorium. Gale Edwards (67) will direct the alumni production of 'Mountaintop'.

Harper said that only 250 tickets would be available for the event at \$40 a piece. All proceeds will benefit Rochester College. Friends of the College who cannot attend the event may still make tax-deductible donations. To order tickets or to donate, call (248) 218-2226.

ter during the Gulf War, received a thunderous ovation when he said his country would be with the United States in its war on terrorism "every step of the way, from beginning to end."

The former head of state said that no nation on earth is better suited for global military and economic leadership than the United States. He urged the largely American audience to not shrink from using arms when situations demand it but to also make better use of economic statesmanship to battle the roots of terrorism.

"Within the next 20 years, 40 million African children will be orphaned by AIDS," said Major. "Only the United States can lead the world in an effort like the Marshall Plan to address this problem."

The Marshall Plan was a US-funded recovery plan for 18 European nations devastated by World War II. The billions of dollars the US invested in postwar Europe helped prevent the Communist bloc from spreading further west, a key component of the Truman Doctrine (also known as "containment").

Major said the US must keep with the spirit of the Marshall Plan, using its prosperity to help build poor nations or become an object of envy and hatred for the rest of the world.

On the subject of terrorism, Major said the US must be resolute in its war against murderers like Osama bin Laden and Saddam Hussein. Of the two, Major singled Hussein out as the gravest threat to American interests.

"Saddam Hussein is a psychopath and an international menace," said Major. "Iraq is developing nuclear weapons, it is developing chemical weapons and it is developing a delivery system that will enable it to fire them over very large areas. We have every reason to fear that Saddam Hussein may use them. He has already used chemical and biological weapons against people in his own country. He would not be shy about using them elsewhere."

"Will there be another war? It could come to that. But first, diplomacy and persuasion will be given a chance. If that fails, there will be a determination to destroy sites harboring or manufacturing weapons of mass destruction. And if it comes to that, America and her allies cannot and will not back off."

In conclusion, Major pled with the audience to provide leaders who would not engage in "soundbite politics". He called on the College leaders, professors and students to think critically and pursue real solutions that would hold up in the long run.

"He definitely hit the nail on the head," said Michele Kirby, 30, an Oakland Township, Michigan, resident studying business management at the College. "There's no question we need to have our act together."

Elton Albright, principal organizer of Partnership Dinner XXXI, said he was delighted by the speech and the audience's response.

"I think Partnership Dinner XXXI set the precedent for quality that will draw a lot of new people eto next year's event," said Albright. "We also raised a lot of money for student scholarships."

Albright was especially pleased that Major drew substantial coverage from Detroit's print, radio and television news media.

"I don't think we could put a dollar value on all of the exposure this event generated in southeastern Michigan," said Albright.

Born on April 26, 1916, to a preacher in Shawnee, Oklahoma, Wheeler Utley spent much of his childhood in Oklahoma and Kansas.

As a high school senior, Utley sold his clarinet for \$40 to start a printing business. He eventually moved to Detroit where his brother, Robert, joined the business.

Even as the Utleys' company was rapidly growing, Wheeler made time to preach every Sunday for churches in Ann Arbor, Birmingham, Clawson, Keego and Ynsilanti

Keego and Ypsilanti.

In 1954, Utley and eight other Christians formed the North Central Christian Foundation to establish a Christian school in the Detroit area. The Foundation made him chairman in 1955 and two years later he discovered the future site of the College near Rochester, Michigan. North Central Christian College opened its doors in 1959. Two years later NCCC changed its name to Michigan Christian College.

Three presidents served under Utley: Otis Gatewood, Lucien Palmer and Don Gardner. During Utley's tenure as chairman, the College grew from 54 to 236 students and earned accreditation from the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools. The College also constructed nine of its major buildings and more than doubled its acreage.

Utley retired in 1974 and moved to California where he preached for 14 years at the Sun City Church of Christ.

G. Wheeler Utley is survived by his brother, Robert, a son, Robert, a daughter, Jeanie Bechler and three grandchildren: Jennifer Utley, Steve and Jeff Bechler.


