

Jesse Clayton begins new position as MCC Director of Development

Bringing a broad range of experience to campus with him, Jesse Clayton began the position of Director of Development for Michigan Christian College on August 15. Coming from a background in Christian education, Jesse holds degrees from David Lipscomb College and the Harding Graduate School of Religion.

Most recently, Jesse preached for the Birmingham church for four years. He previously preached in South Bend, Indiana and Chicago, during which time he directed the Lake Geneva Encampment for fifteen years. He currently serves as the Northeast Editor of the Gospel Advocate and on the board of the Shults Lewis Children's Home.

Concerning the future of the college, Jesse commented, "MCC has great potential to serve the church in the midwest. As we find more effective ways to serve, I am confident that there will be the resources and the students to build an even greater school."

New campus master plan unveiled


Resulting from a directive by the MCC Board of Directors in October 1978, a new campus master plan has been developed and adopted for accommodating the future growth of Michigan Christian College. Board and campus committees worked for several months with architect Abraham Kadushin of Ann Arbor in analyzing the college's existing facility potential and future needs. The Board then reviewed the final proposal at their July and October meetings and guests enjoyed the first public viewing of the model at the Lectureship.

The plan, pictured on the next page, features a shift in the main entrance and focal point of the campus to a circular drive near the Westside Central Chapel. New construction is arranged on an angle with the Campus Center and Gatewood Residence Hall, while proposed enclosed walkways between some of the major buildings provide protection in inclement weather. Although benefiting from end views of the campus lakes, the plan leaves the majority of the area around the lakes to remain in its natural scenic beauty.

The plan establishes three major groupings of facilities by type of activity, each featuring easy accessibility to one another. Instructional and library areas are grouped near the present Campus Center, while residential facilities are concentrated between the current residence halls. A Campus Hall which houses intercollegiate gymnasium facilities and auditorium seating for about 1500, is located near the athletic fields. A special development of married student and staff housing enjoys the privacy of the east hills overlooking the campus.

The completed plan would serve a student body of 950 students. It is designed to allow for the addition of new facilities in stages, as they are needed, giving the campus a "completed look" at any time during this growth period. It provides a planned location for all major campus improvements from parking lots to major buildings, as such improvements are needed. Current priorities emphasize new science laboratory facilities and a library expansion as initial building needs.







Second-generation student joins students from sixteen states

Marking a significant event for any institution, the first student whose parents both attended Michigan Christian College enrolled for classes on August 27. Mary Blake, daughter of Leonard and Dona Mai (Bruce) Blake, came to MCC from Littleton, Colorado to be a part of MCC's twenty-first year. Mary's father, originally from Newton, Iowa and Mary's mother, originally from Montague, Michigan, met at MCC and graduated with the first class in 1961. In addition to her parents, Mary has six aunts and uncles who also attended MCC.

As residence halls opened on August 25, 280 students from thirteen states and four foreign countries filled the campus with activity. Students came to MCC from Colorado, Florida, Georgia, Illinois, Indiana, Minnesota, Michigan, New York, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Tennessee, Texas, Wisconsin, Ethiopia, Micronesia, Saudi Arabia, and South Africa. Over the years, representatives from thirty-three states and thirty-three foreign countries have made up the student body. Each has brought a unique background that has contributed to a lot of special years.
