Annual Symposium credits academic programming

The annual Rochester College Academic Symposium celebrates the rigorous scholarly research conducted by students from across disciplines. Students enrolled in capstone or senior project courses work throughout the spring semester on their own unique academic pursuits. Then the campus community comes together for a significant all-day event throughout which students present and defend their work in 30-minute presentations.

The Symposium program boasts a diversity of subject matter reflected in scholarly papers, executive simulations, public relations campaigns for real world clients, and musical and theatrical presentations.

The 7th annual Academic Symposium will be conducted on Tuesday, April 20. It will feature a keynote presentation by Dr. Josephine Johnson, a noted psychologist who specializes in working with children, adolescents, couples and families. Named the 2009 Distinguished Psychologist of the Year by the Michigan Psychological Association and a member of the Council of Representatives of the American Psychological Association, Johnson lectures on numerous topics involving psycho-spiritual issues.


