How can Rochester College serve you?

Administrative change in any institution or business normally results in reassessment. Soon after a recent change in leadership at Rochester College, a group of individuals met on campus to discuss ways the college could assist congregations in their efforts to spread the kingdom. While partnerships have continued over the years, participants decided it was time to strengthen connections and become even more involved in the lives of congregations.

"One of the reasons that Christian colleges exist is to serve," stated Elton Albright,

director of church relations. "Our mission goes beyond educating the students that come to our campus. We feel we must also serve the congregations that were responsible for establishing the college."

Since 1959, hundreds of pulpits in Churches of Christ have been filled by college personnel either on a long-term or fill-in basis. Many individuals have benefitted from regional workshops conducted by college faculty and staff. Student groups have knocked doors, assisted with benevolence projects, and provided entertainment for hundreds of youth gatherings around the Midwest and Northeast.

In order to highlight the many good things happening in area congregations and interaction of the college with churches, Dr. Michael Westerfield, interim president of the college, proposed the publication of a newsletter for congregations in the region. As a result, this introductory issue of Church Connections was developed.

"Both the college and the congregations in the region have a history of service, so we felt a publication that would highlight such activities would be helpful for everyone," stated Dr. Westerfield. "Response to the publication will help us determine its future in coming months."

Library houses church history collection

On May 12, 2003, employees of the Ham Library noticed a date on the articles of incorporation for the Plum Street Church of Christ. While unintentional, they were hanging the articles on a library wall exactly 100 years after they were signed.

The document is just one of many artifacts now housed on the campus of Rochester College. The Plum Street congregation, established in the 1860's, holds a unique place in history as the first Church of Christ in metropolitan Detroit.

"Our restoration history collection is

unique because it is the only one in the United States that focuses on this region," stated Steven Bowers, director of library services. "We are indebted to Dr. Vernon Boyd for his efforts in collecting these items and his generous donation of the collection to the college."

In 1992, Dr. Boyd, a minister in the Detroit area for over 30 years, donated his first artifact to the college, a silver communion pitcher given to the Cameron Avenue Church of Christ in 1905. The pitcher likely was used with two chalices until the influenza and tuberculosis epidemics of that era caused churches to begin using individual communion cups.

Since 1992, Dr. Boyd has continued to collect numerous documents, photographs, and artifacts relating to Restoration History in the Great Lakes region. Since the new library opened last fall, Dr. Boyd has started bringing items for a display case on a regular basis as he finishes research. Eventually, the entire collection will be housed in the library.

"Students are intrigued by the collection as much as visitors to the campus," stated Mr. Bowers. "In particular, we have a lot of questions about a rocking chair that once resided in the nursery of the Hamilton Street Church of Christ, a descendant of the Plum Street congregation. All of these items provide a wonderful testimony to our heritage with Churches of Christ."

Six Rochester College ministry majors assisted congregations through internships this past summer. Senior family ministry major Brad Vize from Clinton Township, Michigan, saw "Christ in action" as he observed Russ Bone, minister of the Parkside Church of Christ in Dearborn Heights, Michigan, gently and effectively minister to people in a variety of settings. Senior Chris Shields from Richton Park, Illinois, served as a worship and youth ministry intern and "learned about sensitivities in leading people to the throne of God." Despite international tensions and the State Department discouraging travel, Henry Oyier, a junior computer systems management major, returned this summer to his homeland of Kenya, along with eight other students from Rochester College to help approximately 500 homeless youth. Each day, they taught Bible classes, played sports, and prepared food for the street kids. The nine also conducted a leadership camp for eighteen young men and women, who will use their newly acquired skills to help the street kids in coming months.

Five Rochester College students spent part of their summer in Bangkok, Thailand, teaching conversational English using stories from the gospel of Luke. The group read with approximately ninety university age students through contacts with the Thai Christian Center. About half of the Thai College Youth Group at the Center learned about Jesus and were baptized through earlier efforts of the Let's Start Talking program.

Four congregations partner for ministry

Imagine distributing over 28,000 pounds of food and thousands of articles of clothing to over 300 needy families in just one month. Then imagine running that type of ministry on an ongoing basis throughout the year in one of the wealthiest counties in the United States. Such a task sounds either overwhelming or unlikely.

Four Michigan congregations in northern Oakland County have made such a ministry a reality. The Lake Orion, Rochester, Romeo, and Waterford congregations have joined hands over recent years to develop God's Helping Hands, a model benevolence program for needy families.

"All four congregations support God's Helping Hands both financially and with volunteers," stated Lisa Cain, a 1987 graduate of Rochester College who coordinates the ministry with her husband Brian. "Other congregations like Hazel Park have recently donated items and we often pass on large amounts of surplus clothing to the Lemay congregation in Detroit for disbursement in the inner city."

Developing several years ago from a series of modest clothing giveaways hosted by the Lake Orion and Rochester congregations, God's Helping Hands now operates out of a 3,200 square foot facility with storage units that soar twelve feet in the air. The ministry doubled its space about a year ago in order to more efficiently serve the growing number of families that come to them each month.

"Once a month, families are able to come to our facility and receive a supply of food and once every three months they can obtain clothing," stated Mrs. Cain. "Due to the harsh economic times, we have experienced a steady increase in the number of families that need our help. To date we have served over 2,400 families."

Since its inception, God's Helping Hands has provided materials to touch the spiritual lives of the people it serves in addition to helping with their physical needs. Since January, the center has distributed 700 copies of God's Eternal Plan, a new book written by Jerry Tallman, the evangelism minister at the Rochester congregation.

"People are very open to taking Jerry's book," stated Mrs. Cain. "Jerry has been receiving calls from some of the individuals who have read his book. This is just one of the ways we are reaching families."


